Forger Pleads Guilty.
Toronto, Nov. 24.—Yesterday afternoon Alexander J. Campbell, alias James Campbell, was arraigned before Judge Morgan on the charge of passing several worthless checks, issued on the Traders' Bank. The checks were given on August 4 to Adam Nelson for \$40, on August 8 to same party for \$10, on August 22 for \$20, and on August 31 for \$10, each to J. M. Boyne of the Walker House. Campbell pleaded guilty, and gave as his excuse "drunk." He put up a plea for his wife and family, and promised to do better. His record showed he had been sentenced to the penitentiary in 1901 for two years, and again in 1903 for the same term, and for similar offenses. He is also wanted in Cobourg for passing a worthless check. Judge Morgan remanded him for a week, so that the firm he had been working for could be asked if they would employ him again, and also that enquiries could be made as to whether he had been living with his wife.

CONVENTION NEXT AUTUMN.

Dominion Conservatives Are to Gather in Winnipeg.

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—(Toronto News Special).—A Dominion Conservative convention will be held next autumn, probably in Winnipeg. It is proposed to have a full representation of the party from all parts of Canada, and to take the eastern members of the party to the gateway of the west, there to get in touch with the new problems which the development of the west presents. The proposal to hold a convention of the party dates from last autumn. The original suggestion was to hold it prior to the summoning of the House, and at it to settle the several questions which pressed for solution, including that of the leadership. The time, however, was too short to organize so large a gathering, while in addition the winter was not a suitable time. The project next broached was to hold it this autumn, but the lateness of the session and the disorganization in the party blocked that proposal.

LONG CRUISE TO MANILA.

Steel Dry Dock to Be Towed From Chesapeake Bay.

Washington, Nov. 25.—J. D. Wood, a tug master of Norfolk, has signed a contract to tow to Manila on the D. D. Dewey, on one of the most remarkable cruises of modern times. The D. D. Dewey is the big steel floating dry dock which is destined to dock the largest ships of the American navy in the far east, if it can be successfully piloted through the 14,000 miles lying between Chesapeake Bay and Manila Bay.

An Englishman's Suicide.
Niagara Falls, Ont., Nov. 25.—Fred Toulton, an Englishman, aged 35 years, employed in the quarries at Sherbrooke, committed suicide by shooting himself through the head with a revolver, while sitting in bed at his boarding-house. He had been drinking and was despondent. He leaves a brother in Huron, Ontario, and a widowed mother in England.

Will Meet in February.
Toronto, Nov. 25.—Hon. Mr. Hanna, Provincial Secretary, said yesterday the next session of the Legislature will probably begin the first week in February. Many of the members had been pressing for an early session.

Silver For Sanford Evans.
Winnipeg, Nov. 25.—Sanford Evans, retiring editor of the Winnipeg Telegram, has been presented with a handsome cabinet of silver by the staff of the paper as a farewell memento.

BIG PROFITS DUE CO.

Earnings of Loans of New York Life Co. to Third Parties.

\$59,310 Paid to "Insurance Legislative Generalissimo," Andrew Hamilton, and No Entry of Transaction Appeared on Books—Similarly to Geo. W. Perkins, the Amount Being \$40,000—Loss Through Rentals.

New York, Nov. 25.—Startling developments were brought out yesterday's session of the Armstrong committee on insurance investigation in the course of a minute inquiry by Charles E. Hughes, counsel to the committee, into the syndicate transactions participated in by the New York Life Insurance Co. The most important witness of the day was Milton M. Madison, a book-keeper of the New York Life Insurance Co., during the trial of the case of the United States Steel Corporation Syndicate, the managers of which were J. P. Morgan & Co., there appeared in one instance a profit due to the New York Life of \$57,175, from which was deducted, no reason being given, the sum of \$59,310, paid to Andrew Hamilton, who has been described in the course of the investigation as "the insurance legislative generalissimo."

Pressed by Hughes to tell whether he knew of any other instance of money due the New York Life being paid to a third party, Mr. Madison recalled the payment in 1904 of \$40,000 to George W. Perkins, representing the profit on a loan of \$300,000 to the Boston firm of Kidder, Peabody & Co. The profit, witness said, came in the form of a cheque on the First National Bank, which he cashed and gave the money to Mr. Perkins. What the latter did with it the witness did not know. No entry of the transaction was made on the books of the New York Life.

Gerald Brown, in charge of the bond department of the Equitable, produced a list of the tenants of the Equitable building at 120 Broadway. Mr. Hughes looked the list over and then asked the witness if he thought the rentals were adequate. Mr. Brown replied that he considered the rental of the Mercantile Safe Deposit Co. was inadequate. He also thought that the Equitable Trust Co. rental of \$20,000 a year was inadequate.

Mr. Brown said, in reply to questions, that the King Model Houses on 137th street, New York, were taken by the Equitable Society under a foreclosing, sold to H. H. King, Jr., and that the Equitable Society supplied \$100,000 for construction and improvements. The society held a mortgage on the houses and when completed Mr. King deeded them back. Mr. Brown said he supposed King was there to make a profit on the sub-lease of the houses. "The Equitable put up all the money and King took all the profit," asked Mr. Hughes.

"Yes, if you want to put it that way," said Mr. Brown.

"What officers are responsible for this transaction?" "The executive committee," said Mr. Brown.

George T. Wilson, fourth vice-president of the Equitable Society, gave a list of the new foreign business of the society showing that it increased from \$28,725,390 in 1899 to \$32,585,647 in 1904. Mr. Wilson said that the Equitable had closed up many foreign fields as they proved unprofitable.

MAY ABANDON ST. JOHN.

Donaldson Line Threatens to Take Ships to Baltimore.

St. John, N.B., Nov. 25.—The strike situation is still unbroken. A carload of forty-two men arrived yesterday from Montreal, but after learning the conditions twenty-seven refused to work.

The Donaldson Line people have given out word that if the local men do not give in soon the company will withdraw its ships from the port and go to Baltimore. More men are expected from Montreal, the Allans contending they can get enough to do all their work. Two or three big ships are due here and local men feel the freight cannot be handled.

PORTE'S VEILED THREAT.

Reprisals on Christians If Powers Persist in the Warlike Demonstration For Macedonian Reforms.

Constantinople, via Sofia, Bulgaria, Nov. 25.—The Porte's reply to the demands of the powers is not only a categorical rejection, but contains thinly veiled threats that the pressure of Europe will possibly excite the Turkish population to reprisals on the Christians. The note declares that the Ottoman Government loyally introduced the reforms demanded by the Muezzin program, and says that if these did not entirely succeed the fault was in the hatred dividing the nationalities in Macedonia and indignation from abroad. The communication states that the Turkish Government finds it absolutely impossible to accept financial control of Macedonia, as it would violate the Sultan's sovereignty. After agreeing to the prolongation of the mandates of the foreign civil agents, the note concludes: "If the powers increase the pressure in order to compel the acceptance of the control scheme, the Imperial Government declines all responsibility for the consequences which may arise from the discontent among the public."

Warships On the Move.

Paris, Nov. 25.—It is stated in official quarters here that the exchanges of communications between the powers concerning Turkey's answer to their ultimatum have resulted in the practical determination not to consider the answer as postponing the naval demonstration which will proceed without further parley.

It is understood that the warships of the powers are already moving from Piraeus. Their objective is not yet definitely stated, but the Island of Mytilene still appears to be the objective applicable to the situation.

R. C. R. FOR HALIFAX DEC. 4.

British Soldiers Have Gone Home—Active Recruiting at Toronto.

Toronto, Nov. 25.—There will be room for eighty more soldiers at Stanley Barracks inside of two weeks. The British soldiers, who have been stationed at Halifax, sailed for home yesterday, and orders have been received at Stanley Barracks from the Militia Department, for another detachment of the Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry to leave for Halifax Dec. 4.

Recruiting for the regulars here is going on with some activity. A sergeant of the permanent force is visiting the places where embryo soldiers are to be found, with hopes of filling the blanks made by the draft to Halifax.

Halifax Garrison Sails.

Halifax, Nov. 25.—The Dominion line steamer Kensington sailed last night with the contingent of the Royal Garrison Regiment and other troops to Liverpool. The troops consisted of R. G. Regiment, R. G. Artillery, R. A. Medical Corps and school staff. There are now less than 200 Imperial troops remaining here, including headquarters staff, Royal Engineers, and fifty members of the R. G. Regiment.

GIVES EVIDENCE ON DEATH BED.

Montreal Election Worker Dies After Examination.

Montreal, Nov. 25.—Final evidence in the Gallery election trial has been taken in the examination of the three sick witnesses, Charles Myron, John Gallery and Martin Fitzgerald, who were examined at their bedside by F. J. Bisallion, K.C. A sad feature of the case was that Chas. Myron died very shortly after his examination.

Mr. Fitzgerald said he had been chairman of Mr. Gallery's Ottawa street committee, the most important committee in the election, and had employed from seventy-five to one hundred men locating and distributing election cards. He said he got \$1,500 from Mr. Gallery and used all this except \$19 in paying the workers. He denied having paid any scrutineers or men for work on election day, and knew absolutely nothing about paying any carters.

H. N. Bronckner's Suicide.
Boston, Nov. 25.—A man, who registered at the Hotel Nottingham Wednesday night as Harry N. Bronckner of Ottawa, was found dead yesterday by a chambermaid. The medical examiner said that the cause of death was an overdose of laudanum. Bronckner was 33 years old and was a member of a prominent family in Chester, England. He served in the English army in the Boer war. He went to Toronto, Ont., two or three years ago. Soon after his arrival in Toronto he was elected to membership in the Empire Club. While in that city he was engaged in the insurance business. He leaves a wife and child at Balm Beach, near Toronto.

Mitchell Denies Interview.
Pittsburg, Nov. 25.—An alleged interview printed here yesterday, in which President John Mitchell and Vice-President Lewis of the United Mine Workers of America are made to say that 50,000 workmen employed in the bituminous and anthracite coal fields will strike on April 1, 1906, if the operators attempt to reduce their wages, is emphatically denied by both President Mitchell and Vice-President Lewis.

Convicts Fight For Liberty.
Jefferson City, Mo., Nov. 25.—In a desperate attempt to escape from the State Penitentiary yesterday, five convicts fought for freedom with weapons and nitroglycerine at the prison gates. One Peter James Bessy stood in the pillory in the Old Bailey on that day for perjury and was the last of a long line of victims, for it was abolished immediately afterward. Originally, like most medieval punishment, it was intended more as a disgrace than as a bodily discomfort, but a crowd that would watch all night to gloat over a public hanging in the morning naturally did not spare the victims of the pillory, who sometimes died from the treatment they received. More humane was the punishment for perjury in 1468, when the offenders were merely sentenced to ride from Newgate to Cornhill with paper miter on their heads. But they knew a thing or two in the middle ages, and no doubt there was a street boy even in 1468.—London Chronicle.

New York Mayorality.
New York, Nov. 25.—Seven indictments in election cases were handed down yesterday in Brooklyn by the grand jury.

The four election inspectors arrested Thursday night for neglect of duty pleaded not guilty yesterday, and were held in \$2,500 bail each.

FOUND DYING IN BED.

Young High School Teacher Dies From a Revolver Wound.

Quebec, Nov. 25.—Fereiman Jenner, a young man, believed to be married, and belonging to Charing Cross, Ont., but for the past four or five years a teacher in the Quebec High School, was found in a dying condition at his boarding-house in this city yesterday morning with a bullet wound through his left temple.

Alongside of him in bed was a revolver. He was taken to Jeffery Hall Hospital, where he died shortly afterwards, without recovering consciousness. He was a professor of shorthand, bookkeeping and writing at the High School, and took a prominent part in athletics, especially football.

MAKE FALSE SHIPMENTS.

Employes Rob Wholesale Grocery Firm of Goods Worth \$15,000.

Halifax, N.S., Nov. 25.—A few days ago the firm of A. & W. Smith, wholesale grocers, discovered a shortage of stock in their various warehouses. A considerable quantity of flour and sugar was missing. Last Thursday night the police arrested one of the firm's shippers, F. C. Locke, who, it is alleged, made false shipments of goods.

A searching investigation of the books of the firm is being made, and it is expected a shortage will amount to \$15,000.

Walter Kennedy, another shipper, drove up to the police station and gave himself up during the afternoon. A checker in the Intercolonial Railroad freight shed was arrested on suspicion, as was also a porter in a city hardware store.
