SHOOTING AFFRAY NEAR GRAND FALLS

Felix Francoeur Shot and Killed—
Joseph Grenier Charged With
the Crime

Grand Falls, Sept. 12.—Felix Francoeur, aged 52, engaged in sawing lumber, was shot through the breast and instantly killed this afternoon. It is charged, by Joseph Grenier, a farmer, about 75 years of age. The shooting took place in the Drummond road about half a mile from Grand Falls, just in front of the home of Napoleon Michaud, and he and others in the house witnessed the tragedy.

It is said that Francoeur and Grenier had been unfriendly for some time as a result of a dispute over some lumber. They met in the road and a quarrel took place. As a result, Francoeur struck Grenier with his fist and the latter immediately whipped out a revolver from beneath his coat and fired pointblank at Francoeur. The latter lurched forward and fell dead. Grenier then replaced the weapon and walked away, presumably going toward his home, about six miles from town.

News of the shooting was brought to Grand Falls and the town was greatly excited. James Tibbitts, of Andover, sheriff of the county, was communicated with and a warrant was immediately issued on his instructions for the arrest of Grenier.

Late in the afternoon Constable Jeremiah Sullivan set out for the St. John river road to apprehend Grenier, but up to a late hour to night he had not returned.

George Ryan, coroner, has empaneled a jury and an inquest will begin this morning.

Francoeur, known also as "Hart," an English rendering of his name, leaves his wife and one daughter.

Grenier has a wife and family. His home is located some distance in the woods and difficulty was anticipated in reaching it tonight, while there is no absolute assurance that he went there.

Grand Falls, Sept. 13.—Joseph Grenier, the seventy year old farmer, for whom search was being made following the shooting of Felix Francoeur, near Grand Falls on Thursday afternoon, was apprehended this afternoon soon after three o'clock, by a party consisting of Constable Jeremiah Sullivan, Alan McLoughlin, sub-district liquor inspector, Charles Paradis, a returned soldier, and Walter V. Powers, a volunteer searcher.

The search party went to Grenier's house this afternoon and not finding him there started to search the woods back of the house. Powers and McLoughlin went up on a small knoll to look over the adjacent country and Grenier, hiding in the grass and under brush nearby, then called out:

"Is that you, Powers? Are you looking for me? I know you and will go along with you."

The old man had been hiding in the wet bush with no protection other than a short light raincoat and had had nothing to eat since early in the morning. He was very cold and fast approaching a stage of physical exhaustion and seemed glad to be taken into custody. The party took him to his home, fed and re-clothed him before bringing him to Grand Falls where he was lodged in the county jail. Other than his remarks to Powers, as quoted, Grenier made no statement of importance.

The preliminary hearing will be held at Grand Falls at 10 o'clock Saturday morning before Magistrate Kelly.

Grand Falls, Sept. 13.—The

preliminary hearing in the case of Joseph Grenier, who is under arrest on the charge of murdering Felix Francoeur, was commenced today. No evidence was taken, and the hearing was postponed until Tuesday morning, when Alex Stratton, who was employed as a clerk by Mr. Francoeur, will appear as a witness for the crown.

Joseph Grenier is at present in the town jail here awaiting the result of the preliminary hearing. It is reported here that when he was arrested, several hundred dollars were found in his pockets.

HON. J. F. TWEEDDALE MAKES ABLE SPEECH

At Opening of Fredericton's Big Exhibition

On Saturday evening the big Fredericton fair was opened, and the chief speaker was Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, who said:

I am pleased to be here tonight, at this the opening of your Exhibition, and, as this is recognized as the Provincial Exhibition this year, it is disappointing that it has not been honored at its Opening with an address from His Honor, the Lieutenant Governor and the Premier, and appropriate that the Minister, presiding over the Provincial Department of Agriculture be present.

When we realize the fact that the agricultural products of Canada, according to statistics, have a greater monied value than have the combined products of our three other great natural resources, our Forests, Fisheries and Mines, the importance of Agriculture will be appreciated.

It seems to have been the decree of Divine Providence, in proving the metal and minerals of the mines, the forest growths and the beaming millions of the fishes of the sea, together with the products of the soil, for the use of man,—that man must work and toil before he can avail himself of their benefits, so necessary for his comfort; in fact, for the sustenance of his life.—We can see that this was a wise provision, as it compels energy, industry, the exercise of our physical, as well as mental and inventive powers, giving development to both mind and body, that elevates the human family to a higher standard of civilization than would obtain were these things to be gotten without exertion. But the products of the soil, which go more directly to the sustenance of life, differ from the products of our other natural resources,—the minerals and metals, our forest growth, the food obtained from the oceans, already exist; but the products of the soil are creative. The wheat and other grains, the corn, vegetables, cultivated fruits, do not exist; they are only produced by intelligent cultivation, brought about by bringing into action the chemical qualities of the soil that create vegetable life, which cause a multiplied reproduction, the success of which is dependent upon climatic conditions, a well regulated supply of heat, light and moisture,—elements altogether in the control of a benign Providence.

These facts, at once make us realize also how much more directly we are dependent on the farmer for our existence than those engaged in the other industrial life of the country.

It is not long since farming was looked upon as a menial occupation, but it is now being recognized as a business the success of which requires close and constant application, as well as a knowledge gained by experience of how to cultivate the soil and manage the work. And, by reason of the world's demands and requirements for more food stuffs, the old saying is more than ever true,—that he who makes two blades of grass grow where only one grew before, is a public benefactor.

We have just emerged from the most destructive war known to civilization, to which Canada has contributed, both in blood and treasure, according to population, equally, if not greater than any of the Allied Forces. The valor of our troops has materially con-
