Nothing can be unfeeling in a pre-

gressive age and among a progres-

sive people than to quote a man's  
opinion of forty years ago—and

John Globe, and considering the

THE LATE DR. BOWDOIN'S VIEW.

To the Editor of the Globe:

Sir,—I noticed in your issue of Friday,

under the heading of "The Annexation

Question in 1840-50," a letter of the late Dr.  
Bowdoin, dated May 22nd, 1850, ex-pressing the opinion which he then held on  
certain political subjects. Since that  
time various changes have occurred which  
may have tended to alter or at least  
modify these opinions. The mind also,  
as men advance in years, takes a larger  
and more comprehensive view of sur-rounding circumstances. I therefore  
suggest, in justice to Dr. Bowdoin's  
memory, that the opinions which he held  
in 1850 should not be considered as presen-tative of those formed in later life by his  
more mature judgment and longer expe-
