Sophie Sparkle the celebrated correspondent sends us a sample letter from New York. We make the following extracts:  
**LITERARY WORLD.**

People are discussing Carlyle unluckily "Reminiscences," and since Lord Beaconsfield's death "Lothair" and "Eudymion" are the novels mostly in demand. I should like to introduce you into good society, and to keep you there until the end of the volume. Even his "heavy villains" move in the first circles and are apparently gentlemen of high degree. As for Carlyle, woman and Americans have little reason to be charmed with his "Reminiscences." The bitterness of the cynic is upon every page, and it might have been better, perhaps, for Carlyle, had some blundering housemaid stolen this MSS. also, with which to light the kitchen fire, as did the damsel in John Stuart Mill's household, who cooked the philosopher's breakfast with the first MSS. volume of Carlyle's "French Revolution."

Mr. Joaquin Miller, the "Poet of the Sierras," has settled down in New York, and has recently published a novel entitled "The Shadows of Shasta" in which the cause of the poor Indian is warmly espoused, and the army handled without glove. Mr. Miller looks the romantic poet he is. He has deep blue eyes, a Shakespearean head with brown, flowing locks, and, although quite civilized, still clings to moccasins and other mementoes of the days when he dwelt among his "good friend the Modocs." The poet's novel is dedicated to Mr. Whitelaw Reid, the editor of the N. Y. Tribune, who has recently married a California heiress of millions, and gone to Europe to pass his honeymoon—where may all good wishes follow him. Editors do sometimes fall into luck, although the public do not always give them the credit for having deserved it. Rumor has it that Mr. James Gordon Bennett, of the N. Y. Herald, engaged to a veritable Princess—and journalists are more apt to be pining than ever in their ideal.

**THEATRICAL CELEBRITIES.**  
Lotta is once more beguiling our susceptible youths with her quips and capers, and Mrs. Anderson, having completed her most prosperous season, will summer in her cottage at Long Branch. Poor little Maurice Denremont, the boy violinist who has charmed all the world with his art, is said to be dangerously ill. The musical world will lose one of its brilliant stars should this young genius be taken from us, and it is ardently hoped that his life will be spared. Miss Sarah Bernhardt has sailed away for Europe, bearing with her \$200,000, a snug little
