Dear Mother:

This is Tuesday evening and I have just returned from Uncle Herb's funeral.

About nine o'clock this morning I received a wire from Colonel Mc-Avity that Uncle Herb was killed in action last night. He was killed in action last night. He was killed in a communication trench as he was going in to inspect his lines. He was hit by a high explosive shell, and a good thing about it was that he never knew what happened. He was killed insantly.

They brought his body out and it was burled in a Belgian village this afternoon at three o'clock. A big cathedral is in the centre of the village, and his grave is in its churchyard.

They gave him a grand burial. The

There were about a hundred officers in the procession.
