A POLITICAL SHUFFLE

It looks as if a political shuffle is about to take place in New Brunswick. On Thursday a meeting of Premier Foster's supporters is to be held and it is altogether likely that something definite will be decided on that date. Rumor has it that Premier Foster will resign the Premiership and Hon. P.J. Veniot will likely succeed him. Hon. A.B. Copp may accept a judgeship and (Lieut. Governor Pugsley may be given a seat in the senate. The names of Hon. C.W. Robinson of Moncton and Mr. W. F. Todd of St. Stephen are suggested as possible men for the governorship.

Premier Foster may go to Ottawa, but nothing is yet known definitely. The people of New Brunswick may soon be given something in the way of a political shuffle, which will cause them to give serious consideration.

BATHURST DEFEATS CHATHAM TEAM 6-1

Gloucester Boys Register Fifth Victory—More Than 1,200 at Game Including 300 Brought on Special Train From Chatham

Bathurst, N. B., Jan. 22—The Bathurst hockey team registered its fifth victory in the northern section of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island League schedule by defeating Chatham to the tune of 6 to 1 here tonight. The game was by no means as one-sided as the score would indicate and was exceedingly fast and clean, only one penalty being handed out, and that was for an unintentional infraction of the rules. Bathurst notched the first score when Schryer, on a pass from Lawlor, slipped a short shot past Lobban's guard about fourteen minutes after the opening of the game, these fourteen minutes being as closely contested a struggle and as evenly balanced as one would wish to see.

The visitors speeded up a good deal after that and kept Moar busy warding them off until the first period closed but were unable to get the rubber beyond the stone wall against them.

In the second period Ryan did the trick for Bathurst after some very nice combination play and about a minute later Chatham made their one and only score of the evening when McLean caught Moar off his guard. That ended the scoring for this period but the Chatham boys rained shots at Moar and Bathurst kept Lobban busy, too.

Bathurst took the lead strongly in the third period making a start in two minutes when D. Cripps bulged

the net on a pass from R. Cripps. Five minutes later Schryer rushed through the whole opposition line-up and marked up Bathurst's fourth tally.

Crosby made another point a minute later on a pass from R. Cripps and two minutes afterwards Lawlor finished the scoring with number six.

The Chatham team worked hard and did some excellent work but their most frantic efforts were foiled by Moar and frequently the Bathurst defence proved too clever and speedy for them.

More than 1,200 people witnessed the game, about 300 coming from Chatham and Newcastle on a special train.

Jack Twaddell, of Amherst, officiated as referee and his work could not have been improved upon.

Newcastle's total cost of Poor relief amounted to \$1502.93, and Chatham \$2084.15.

Of the 1922 Assessments, Newcastle Town is the only one which paid 100% assessment, while the Parish paid 84.1%. Chatham Town paid 52% of assessment and Parish 88.6%.
