

The Tragedy

ON BART. LAKE SIMCOE

SEAMAN JUKE, UNDER ARREST ON VESSEL FOR THE KILLING OF SEAMAN SEARS, TAKEN IN CUSTODY BY THE POLICE AND BROUGHT TO POLICE STATION — PATHETIC SCENE WITH PRISONER'S WIFE.

The town was filled with commotion to-day when it became known that the barque Lake Simcoe, Capt. Wilson, had arrived from Pernambuco after a passage of 29 days. The cause of the excitement was that one of the vessel's seamen, John Juke, was on board a prisoner, as it was already known that Juke was charged with the killing of a shipmate named John Sears, who met his fate by being stabbed to death while the Lake Simcoe was on route to Pernambuco from this port. The facts of the case as gleaned by a Telegram reporter to-day are briefly thus: The Lake Simcoe left here on September 5th for Pernambuco fish laden from Baine Johnston & Co. On the day of sailing the crew had been "jolly" together, and little did any of the seamen think of the tragedy which was to occur on board. Everything went well until exactly a week after sailing, when seaman John Sears was killed on the deck of the vessel. This was on September 12th, at 5 o'clock in the morning, when Juke, who was asleep in the fore-cabin, awoke from his slumbers and, rushing to the deck like a madman, according to the story of his shipmates, brandishing a large seaman's knife in his right hand, ran towards Sears, who was on watch at the time, and who had just got a "mug up" from the cook. Thereupon Juke raised the weapon over the head of Sears and plunged it into his neck. Bosun Williams and seaman Power and another seaman, a Russian Finn, who were on deck at the time, witnessed the awful happening. Sears, who was stabbed, had the jugular vein severed and ran to the cabin with the life blood flowing from him, arousing the captain and mate, who were asleep. At this juncture Juke remained in the place where he committed the deed and was apparently in a desperate state, whilst those who witnessed the stabbing became nervous and ran hastily to the cabin for the captain's gun with which to protect themselves.

The victim, John Sears, never spoke to anyone and succumbed in the course of three minutes as a result of the wound he received. Following his death the remains were prepared for burial, and at noon on the very day of the tragedy the body was consigned to the deep.

John Sears was 21 years of age, unmarried, and leaves two brothers to survive him—Patrick and Robert, his parents having predeceased him. The deceased was a fine sturdy young sailor and was well liked by Capt. Wilson and crew.

As far as can be ascertained the murder occurred without the slightest provocation whatever. John Juke, the perpetrator of the deed, has made quite a number of passages in foreign going sailing vessels, and we are told by those who know him quite well that he has always been mentally unbalanced. It is only a matter of months ago when he jumped overboard out of the same vessel when she was coming on this coast from a Brazilian port. On that occasion the weather was fine and he was rescued, only to again attempt to repeat his rash act, having to be tied down.

It is said that Juke and Sears did have a private grievance, but what it was will not be known until it comes out in evidence. We hear from parties who profess to know that both the accused and the victim had been fishing together in the early part of the summer at Flatrock.

A SAD SPECTACLE.
A sad spectacle was witnessed this morning when the Lake Simcoe hauled into the King's wharf at 9.30 and landed the prisoner, who had been in gross through the passage. Hundreds of people gathered around the pier eager to catch a glimpse of Juke. On reaching the shore Juke was taken into custody by Superintendent Grimes and Detective Tobin, who handcuffed him and escorted him to the police station. Before leaving the pier, Johanna Juke, wife of the prisoner, arrived on a scene crying bitterly. She grasped hold of her husband tightly by the waist. At this stage the prisoner broke down, tears flowed from his eyes, and the sight was a sad and touching one. The police arrangements were poor. There was not a cab ready to take along the prisoner, who had to walk through Water Street under police escort, followed by an immense concourse. Inspector General Sullivan and Deputy Minister of Justice Hutchings were interviewed to-day by the Evening Telegram. Asked as to what time they were ready to proceed with the preliminary hearing, they stated they did not know. The prisoner is now at the police station, where his relatives are visiting him. Juke is 40 years of age.

Confiscated Issue of Vienna Paper.

Vienna, Nov. 27.—Because of the publication by the Arbeiter Zeitung of the peace manifesto, issued by the International Socialist Congress at Basel, Switzerland, yesterday's issue of the paper was confiscated. The president of the chamber refused to allow an interpellation on the subject by the Social Democrats.

Herr Seitz protested against the confiscation and the President's ruling created an uproar in the chamber. The president said that in view of the present difficult position of the State, the matter should be considered behind closed doors. Herr Seitz, amid cheers, declared that the people wished peace, but it must be peace with honor. The people were ready to defend the honor and integrity of the empire by all their guns and with all their power. The sitting proceeded behind closed doors.

Life is Brief.



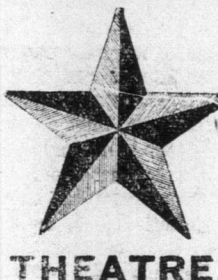

The Armistice Has Been Signed

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.

A protocol arranging the armistice was signed last evening by the Turkish and Bulgarian delegates, the latter representing also Serbia and Montenegro. Prior to this, there had been a long string of the Turkish Ministers to consider fresh proposals submitted by the allies. Apparently the Greek delegates did not sign the protocol. At present nothing is known on this point or of the terms of the armistice. The refusal of Greece to sign the armistice has been in existence for more than a week already. It is not impossible that negotiations may have served to bring about an agreement on general principles, on terms such as would promise a speedy arrangement of a peace treaty, when the conference meet as it is now expected in London. In this case the fact of Greece standing out from the armistice protocol would not be of great importance. In the second place, Greek abstention may mean a serious split among the allies arising from jealousies concerning the possession of Saloniki. The insistence of the Greek on the capitalization of Adrianople, Scutari, Janina and other points which might influence the situation are to be found in the fact that Turkey recently sought to conclude a separate treaty of peace. Bulgaria is apparently not unwilling to enter into alliance with Turkey if the allies are desirous that Turkey shall enter the Balkan Customs League. There is rumor at Sofia that a suggestion has been made to substitute Roumania for Greece in the Balkan League. It seems clear from the report that Bulgaria ignores the Greek offer to land troops on the Gallipoli Peninsula and to send a fleet to attack the Dardanelles that the relations between Greece and Bulgaria are greatly strained. These signs of discussion among the allies leave the situation full of dangerous possibilities. It is reported that France is trying to persuade Greece to adopt a less unyielding attitude. It is understood financial pressure and exhaustion has forced Bulgaria and Serbia to conclude peace. In this respect Greece which secured victories with less expense is better able to continue hostilities.

Conductor Hurt

BY RUNAWAY HORSE.

Just before 6 p.m. yesterday as Conductor Eli Lilly, of Street Car No. 1, was standing at the foot of Adelaide Street, on Water Street, and in the act of reversing the trolley pole on a car he was run down by a runaway horse to which he had his back turned and which, of course, he did not see until it was upon him. The man was thrown to the ground, the carriage went over him and the reins becoming entangled in his legs dragged him along Water Street until opposite Mr. P. J. Shea's grocery where he became disengaged. People who witnessed the accident thought the man had been killed outright and so a crowd collected. The man who was covered with mud was unconscious and was borne by Const. Greene and others into Mr. Shea's store where stimulants were administered and where Dr. Tait attended him. The man had a nasty cut on the forehead, he was hurt about the body and one of his arms was badly sprained. He only recovered consciousness on reaching his home where Dr. Anderson attended him.
