SEAMAN JUKE, UNDER AR-REST ON VESSEL FOR THE KILLING OF SEAMAN WITH PRISONER'S WIFE.

to-day when it became known that the barque Lake Simcoe, Capt. Wilson, had arrived from Pernambuco after a passage of 29 days. The cause of the excitement was that one of the vessel's seamen, John Juke, was on board a prisoner, as it was already known that Juke was charged with the killing of a shipmate named John Sears, who met his fate by being stabbed to death while the Lake Simcoe was en rout to Pernambuco from this port. facts of the case as gleamed by a Telegram reporter to-day are briefly thus: The Lake Simcoe left here on September 5th for Pernambuco fis laden from Baine Johnston & Co. On the day of sailing the crew had been "jollying" together, and little did any the seamen think of the tragedy which was to occure on board. Everything went well until exactly a week after sailing, when seaman John Sears This was on September 12th, at 5 o'clock in the morning, when Juke, who was asleep in the forecastle, awoke from his slumbers and, rushing to the deck like a madman, according to the story of his shipmates, brandishing a large seaman's knife in his right hand, ran towards Sears, who was on watch at the time, and who had just got a "mug up" from the cook. Thereupon Juke raised the weapon over the head of Sears and plunged in into his neck. Bosun Williams and seaman Power and another seaman, Russian Finn, who were on deck a pening. Sears, who was stabbed, ha the jugular vain severed and ran the cabin with the life blood flowing from him, arousing the captain and mate, who were asleep. At this juncture Juke remained in the place where he committed the deed and was apparently in a desperate state, whilst those who witnessed the stab bing became nervous and ran hastily to the cabin for the captain's gun with which to protect hemselves.

The victim, John Sears, never spoke to anyone and succumbed in the course of three minutes as a resul of the wound he received. Following his death the remains were prepared for burial, and at noon on the very day of the tragedy the body was con-

John Sears was 21 years of age, un married, and leaves two brothers to survive him-Patrick and Robert, his parents having predeceased him. The deceased was a fine sturdy young sail or and was well liked by Capt. Wil-

As far as can be ascertained the murder occurred without the slightest provocation whatever. John Juke, the perpetrator of the deed, has made quite a number of passages in foreign going sailing vessels, and we are told by those who know him quite well that he has always been mentally unbalanced. It is only a matter of months ago when he jumped overboard out of the same vessel when she was coming on this coast from a Brazilian port. On that occasion the weather was fine and he was rescued, only to again attempt to repeat his It is said that Juke and Sears did have a private grievance, but what-ever it was will not be known until it comes out in evidence. We hear from parties who profess to know that both the accused and the victim had been fishing together in the early part of the summer at Flatrock.

A SAD SPECTACLE.

A sad spectacle was witnessed this morning when the Lake Simcoe hauled into the King's wharf at 9,30 and landed the prisoner, who had been in irons throughout the passage. Hundreds of people gathered around the or people gathered around the pier eager to catch a glimpse of Juke. On reaching the shore Juke was tak-en into custody by Superintendent Grimes and Detective Tobin, who oner, arrived on the scene crying bitterly. She grasped hold of her husband tightly by the waist. Asked as to what time they were ready to proceed with the pre-liminary hearing, they stated they did not know. The prisoner is now at the police station, where his relatives are visiting him. Juke is 40 years of age.

The Armstice Has Been Signed

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. A protocol arranging the armis-tice was signed last evening by the Turkish and Bulgarian delegates, the atter representing also Servia and Montenegro. Prior to this, there had een a long sitting of the Turkish Mir sters to consider fresh proposals sub mitted by the allies. Apparently the Greek delegates did not sign the protocol. At present nothing is known on this point or of the terms of the armistice. The refusal of Greece to sign the armistice has been in exisence for more than a week already, t is not impossible that negotiations may have served to bring about at igreement on general principles, or erms such as would promise a speedy rrangement of a peace treaty, when conference meet as it is now ex ected in London. In this case the act of Greece standing out from the armistice protocol would not be lace. Greck abstension may mean erious split among the allies arising from jealousies concerning the possession of Saloniki. The insistence o he Greek on the capitalation of Adrianople, Scutari, Janina and othe oints which may influence situation are to be found in the fact that Tur key recently sought to conclude eparate treaty of peace.
