"Don't hurry so. Take the easy and keep your eye on the ball; by and by when you get the hang of it you can speed up."

That is the advice I heard an expert tennis player give a beginner the other day. The beginner had been defeating his own game by the pace at which he tried to play. He would tumble all over himself in his headlong haste, miss the ball because he didn't stop to get his eye on it properly, and retire from his sally breathless and already half-defeated by his own waste of energy. As soon as he began to take the expert's advice he improved rapidly. Sometimes he would miss a return because he advanced too slowly or took too long to get his eye on the ball, but his percentage of failures rapidly diminished. Moreover, the amount of energy he used was steadily less, and his efficiency and hold on himself was steadily greater.

Why am I retelling all this to an audience in which possibly one out of a hundred is interested in tennis? Because it seems to me that the same advice which the expert gave the beginner in tennis is good advice for the beginner in other games, other professions, sciences, arts, etc. Especially well, it seems to me, does it apply to

A New Island Created

By Germany, Situated Near Heligoland.

London, Sept. 8.—Germany has created a new island in the North Sea. It lies off the lower part of Heligoland, and is half as big as that island.

The materials for creating the new island are being sent from Germany. Heligoland is very seldom visited, as it is devoted to military purposes, and every arrival is watched with suspicion. A correspondent of the Daily Mail on a revisit to Heligoland, after two years, records the discovery of the new island, which, he says, shelters small cruiser destroyers, submarines and torpedo boats.

He describes Heligoland as having been changed in an astonishing manner. It has become a huge naval fortress with huge Krupp guns which command all the approaches from the sea.
