PLEVNA, 1877. A town in Bulgaria, the scene of a series of battles between the Turks and Russians and of the memorable siege (Sept. to Dec.) when Osman Pasha, after a heroic defence, surrendered with 40,000 men.  
SIR JOHN ROSS died 1856, aged 75. British Admiral, who began his career of Arctic discovery in 1818 when he accompanied Parry to Baffin Bay. In 1850 he led an expedition in search of Sir John Franklin in the Arctic, but accomplished nothing.

## From Valcartier.

We are in receipt of a letter dated Aug. 22nd, from Private Patrick J. O'Leary, of the 55th Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force, now in training at Valcartier. He says that there is quite a number of Newfoundlanders in the ranks of this battalion and mentions the names of three who are in Citizen's Arm: the Davis, J. Ryan and F. Powell, but does not give their address.

Private O'Leary says that there are now a large number of soldiers quartered at Valcartier, and that recruits are coming in by hundreds every day. The Captain of the company to which O'Leary is attached is a Priest who, the day the letter was written, celebrated Mass and preached a stirring sermon to the boys. All the Newfoundland boys are happy and send regards to their friends at home.

## A Smash-Up.

### BOY'S NARROW ESCAPE.

While Mr. John Smart, of Logy Bay, was bringing a load of dry codfish to the city on Saturday afternoon, his horse, which is young and flighty, ran away and in collision with a milk wagon, resulted in a general smash-up. It was nothing short of miraculous how the boy named John Dodd, aged 13 and belonging to the same place as Mr. Smart, escaped serious injury.

A Telegram reporter was present at the time and saw what happened. The milk wagon came out of place, causing irritation to the horse which bolted. Coming over Cochrane Street in Zig-zag fashion, though at a fast clip, the mad beast was inclining towards the side walk when nearing Duckworth Street where some women were passing. The runaway crashed into a milk wagon in which the boy Dodd was seated. The wheel of Smart's long cart struck the wheel of Dodd's, which was a frail vehicle, smashing it.

The boy was thrown out head foremost, and the extent of his wounds, which at first was thought to be seriously injured, but later it was found that a bruised knee and a cut face was the extent of his wounds. Some provisions that the boy Dodd was minding for his parents who had just left him to visit a nearby store, were also thrown out. The runaway was brought up, having been pitched about 10 yards when the collision occurred, as the wheel of the fish cart separated from the rest. A considerable amount of damage was done to both the runaway and the fish cart, through unscathed. The wonder is that the boy Dodd escaped so well.

At first King thought that some one had been drowned and made an examination of the bottom of the swimming pool but failed to find any trace of a body. Then he procured a boat and dragged a large area of the pond, but again without result. King says he left the pool at 8.30 Saturday night and that there was no clothes of any kind there then. Whilst the police are investigating the affair there is a theory that someone is playing a joke on the caretaker.

## Memorial Tablets.

Two bronze memorial tablets have recently been set up in the Church of England Cathedral in memory of two clergymen who ministered in that parish for many years, the Rev. Frederick H. Carrington, and the Rev. George M. Johnson. The inscriptions on the tablets which were executed by Messrs. Caldwell & Co., of Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, are as follows:—

### Deo Optimo Maximo.

This tablet is erected Anno 1915 by their Children, in memory of the Reverend Frederic Hamilton Carrington, A.B., of Topsfield, Devon, and of his beloved wife, Mary Reilly, of Clonmel, Tipperary.

After serving as Curate in Devon, and as Chaplain to the Duke of Roxburgh, he came to Newfoundland in 1868.

He faithfully administered this Parish as Rector during the twenty years preceding his death Anno 1893.

### Deo Optimo Maximo.

This Tablet is erected Anno 1915 by their Children, in memory of the Reverend George Macness Johnson, of Kineton, Warwick, and of his beloved wife, Frances M., a daughter of the Reverend Frederic H. Carrington. Mr. Johnson came to Newfoundland in 1847, and ministered indefatigably in this Parish during thirty years under that great Prelate, the Rt. Reverend Edward Field, D.D., on whose death he was appointed Rector of Barmingham, Parva, Norfolk, where he died Anno 1901.

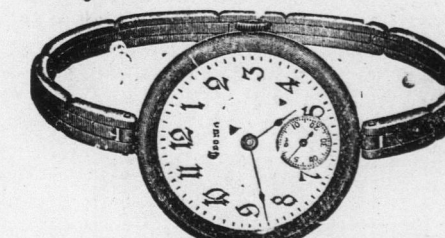
