KAISER SERIOUSLY ILL.

LONDON, Dec. 23. Despatches from Amsterdam and Geneva agree that the Kaiser's illness is much more serious than reported officially from Berlin. Great specialists have been hurriedly summoned to Potsdam, and the Crown Prince has een recalled from the Front. It is authoritatively announced that the Kaiser's projected journeys to the Western theatre of the war and Con-stantinople have been abandoned. It s feared that his illness is due to a currence of the malady which provd fatal to his father.
