GENERAL MEETING LARGELY ATTENDED — NEW OFFICERS ELECTED.

Despite the severity of the weather a large and enthusiastic gathering of the ex-soldiers and sailors attended the general meeting of the Great War Veterans' Association, held in the C. C. C. Hall last night.

Lt.-Col. Sullivan acted as chairman assisted by Captain C. U. Duley. President Mitchell addressed the assembly and outlined the purpose of the meeting, stating that it was the intention to nominate officers for the executive, the election to take place at the next meeting.

Colonel Bernard having been nominated for the presidency, it was proposed by Captain Dicks that the election take place at once and gave time and trouble. This was seconded and balloting was begun. The following officers were elected:

Matters of finance were attended to and the president spoke on the intention of the Association to establish a magazine for the benefit of the G. W. V. A. in the near future, and that Mr. P. R. Emerson will be the editor-in-chief assisted by some of the most prominent literary men in the association. This announcement was greeted with applause.

Several popular comrades addressed the meeting and promised their whole-hearted support for everything that pointed to the advancement and development of the war veterans.

At the close ex-president Mitchell thanked the speakers and asked that they would give Col. Bernard the necessary help, and that all the members would co-operate both for assisting the new president in every possible way and doing their utmost so that the Great War Veterans' Association of Newfoundland may yet be a shining light in the country's future. The meeting closed at 10.30 with the singing of God Save The King.

FIVE FATHOMS UNDER WATER.
The schooner Lottie B. Douglas, which went ashore yesterday near Cape Broyle, lies in 5 fathoms of water.

ASHORE AT CAPE BROYLE.
The schooner Brothers, Parrot master, is ashore near Cape Broyle. She has not broken up and some of the cargo is being salvaged.

WRECKAGE PASSED CAPE.
About noon to-day a lot of wreckage was seen drifting off Cape Spear. Two spars with some sails attached could be made out.

SCHOONER TOTAL WRECK.
Schooner Nereld 129 tons owned by Norris Arm Shipbuilding Co., which was lying at Carbonear drove out of that port and went ashore on Carbonear Island, becoming a total wreck.

ASHORE AT HR. GRACE.
The schooner Peerless has gone ashore at the South Side, of that port, according to a message received in the city this morning. Martin's new foreign-going schooner, according to the same message, had been driven out of Carbonear Hr.

More Marine Disasters.

Constable Wells of Cape Broyle wired the Inspector General that the schooner Brothers of Salmonier went ashore there at 3 o'clock this morning, becoming a total loss. Capt. Parrott and crew were saved. Also that schr. Lottie B., Capt. Burton, had gone ashore at Shores Cove, near Cape Broyle, and was a complete wreck. All the members of the crew landed safely.
