

### Ordination Service.

The Ordination Service held yesterday by the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland in the Cathedral was largely attended by a devout congregation. The following priests occupied seats in the chancel: Rev. Canons Jeeves, Bolt, Field, Smart, Rev. J. T. Hiscock, W. J. Lockyer, Dr. N. S. Facey, and J. Brington, the latter being chaplain. The Rev. John Howard Marks, L. Th., of Durham University was ordained priest and Mr. Ralph Fowlow, a graduate of King's College, Windsor, N.S., was admitted to the Diaconate. The pulpit was occupied by the Rev. N. S. Facey, LL.D., and principal of Queen's College, who delivered an impressive discourse on the vision and call of Isaiah "Here am I send me" VI. Chapter, 8 Verse. The music and singing of the choir was all that could be desired and reflected credit upon those who had charge of the musical arrangements. The service began at eleven o'clock and terminated at one twenty. The ordination was followed by a Choral Eucharist.

### Vaticanal Appointment.

VERY REV. J. V. DONNELLY HONORED.

The announcement has been made from Rome that His Holiness the Pope has raised to the rank of Domestic Prelate the Very Rev. J. V. Donnelly, P.P., Conception Harbor. The conferring of this honor comes with singular appropriateness for, during the year, Father Donnelly will celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. During the ad limina visit of His Lordship, Bishop March, to Rome during the Spring, Father Donnelly administered the affairs of the H. Grace Diocese. His many friends wish that the Rev. Pastor may long enjoy the deserving honor conferred on him.

#### MAKING SYDNEY PORT OF CALL.

The Furness Withy Company have decided to make Sydney a port of call for their regular passenger service steamers sailing between Canada and England. Two steamers, the Sachem and the Digby, which now call at Halifax and St. John's, Newfoundland, will hereafter call here and besides carrying passengers, will also load cargoes. The first of the vessels to arrive here will be the Digby, which is due about June 5th from Halifax. The Digby is commanded by Captain P. W. Chambers, D.S.C.

The Sachem is due here June 12th from Liverpool and after landing passengers will load a part cargo of steel for Liverpool via Halifax. Captain Hayes is in command of the Sachem—Sydney Record.
