Solution of Irish Difficulties Promised.

De Valera Will Meet Premier Lloyd George -- Royal Albert Dock Extension Opened by King.

IS IT PEACE?

"To establish relations of neighborly harmony is the genuine desire of the people of Ireland." Thus speaks Eamonn De Valera, who will meet Premier Lloyd George in London. All operations cease in Ireland on Monday.

May God Grant that Peace may result!

IRISH HOSTILITIES TO CEASE.

LONDON, July 8.

Notice was issued to-day at 10 Downing Street, the Premier's official residence, that arrangements are being made for hostilities in Ireland to cease from noon on Monday. In a letter to Earl Middleton, one of the Southern Unionists who attended to-day conference with the Irish Republicans, Prime Minister Lloyd George said: "The Government fully realizes it would be impossible to conduct negotiations with any hope of achieving satisfactory results, if there is bloodshed and violence in Ireland. It would disturb the atmosphere and make attainment of peace difficult. As soon as we hear De Valera is prepared to enter into conference with the British Government and to give instructions to those under his control to cease from all acts of violence, we should give instructions to our troops and police to suspend active operations against those who are engaged in this unfortunate conflict."

MACREADY MEETS DE VALERA.

DUBLIN, July 8.

General Sir Neville MacReady, military commander in Ireland took part in this afternoon's Conference of Eamonn De Valera, Irish Republican leader and representatives of the Southern Unionists. The Irish Bulletin, official organ of Sinn Fein, in a special edition, this evening, states that Eamonn De Valera informed those present at the Conference in the Mansion House this afternoon of his proposed reply to Premier Lloyd George for a Conference. It is expected here that a truce, to start Monday will be announced to-morrow, the Bulletin adds. Referring to the expression of views at a previous meeting of the Republican Unionist Conference that negotiations were impossible without cessation of bloodshed, the Irish Bulletin says that a letter from Mr. Lloyd George to Earl Middleton was read at to-day's session, in which the Prime Minister concurred in this view indicating the Government's willingness to assent to a suspension of active operations on both sides.

DE VALERA TO MEET LLOYD GEORGE.

LONDON, July 8.

Eamonn De Valera Irish Republican leader, has written to Prime Minister Mr. Lloyd George, accepting the latter's invitation to participate in a conference in London. The letter of Mr. De Valera reads: "Sir, the desire you express on the part of the British Government to end the centuries of conflict between the people of these two islands, and to establish relations of neighborly harmony is the genuine desire of the people of Ireland. I have consulted with my colleagues and secured the view of representatives of the minority of our nation in regard to the invitation you have sent me. In reply I desire to say I am ready to meet and discuss with you on the basis that such conference, as that proposed,

ed, can reasonably hope to achieve the object desired."

ROYAL ALBERT DOCK EXTENSION OPENED.

LONDON, July 8.

London's great new extension to the Royal Albert Dock, which will permit the docking of thirty thousand ton liners within seven miles of St. Paul's Cathedral was opened this morning by King George. Accompanied by Queen Mary, Princess Mary and the Duke of York, the King embarked at Westminster Bridge and proceeded down the river in state. The picturesque royal pageant was witnessed by thousands of persons lining the banks of the Thames.

U.S. CRITICISM OF LLOYD GEORGE.

NEW YORK, July 8.

A special to the Tribune from Washington says that there was tremendous surprise in the United States capital yesterday, when the press cables announced that Premier Lloyd George had said he was waiting a reply from the United States before making a statement on the Anglo-Japanese Treaty. The most popular view among observers here "the despatch continues," is that the distinguished Welshman is endeavoring to smooth over objections raised to the renewal of the Treaty by British Dominions and that he is trying to placate their representatives by over-emphasizing the importance of the information he expects from this country, but the best information available here is that the reports which have been already sent to the British Foreign Office, would not be of a character which would lend themselves to placating representatives of the Dominion.

LEAGUES EXPENSES.

LONDON, July 8.

The total expenses of the League of Nations for the current year have been 21,500,000 gold francs, approximately equivalent among forty eight members, Arthur Balfour informed the House of Commons. Great Britain's share of this expense he said was \$200,000.

EXCESS OF HEAT.

HALIFAX, July 8.

Rain and wind in Ottawa, Toronto and Montreal to-day temporarily relieved the cities of prostrating heat wave which has held them in grip for more than a week. There was continuous heat in New York where scores were prostrated and one woman, temporarily deranged, attempted to commit suicide by jumping off the sea wall at the battery.

BOSTON, July 8.

The Nantucket steamer, Old Colony, ran down the fishing yawl Active, in the harbor, and sent her to the bottom. The steamer rescued the crew.

CAMBRIDGE WINS BIG MATCH.

The annual cricket match between the Universities of Cambridge and Oxford was started on Monday of this week and ended on Wednesday, with a victory for Cambridge by an innings and 24 runs. Cambridge batted first and after making a fine score of 415 runs for eight wickets, the innings was declared. H. Ashton, one of the famous trio of brothers who all obtained their Cambridge cricket "blues" this season, made 118. Oxford was dismissed, thanks mainly to the bowling of Marriott and Gibson, for 162 and 22. Whilst it was generally conceded that Cambridge had some exceptionally talented players this year, so easy a win was certainly unexpected.
