The Herring Situation.

There is no change in the herring situation since our last issue. Conflicting reports are being made relative to conditions and demands in New York and other parts of United States. Some parties writing from there say there is a good market for Newfoundland herring packed by the Scotch method. On the other hand very little demand is so far manifested here. The result is that some of our packers have not yet commenced

operations, and present indications point that the pack this season will be considerably small compared with that of last year. This will likely have a tendency to enhance the demand, and we look forward to a sharp market the latter part of the season. In fact, buyers may likely find it difficult at the closing of the season to obtain their requirements. We believe any packer who moves cautiously and puts up a good quality pack will have little trouble later in making sales. The fishery in the arms the past week was fair and

few herring were taken in the Humber on Saturday. Many of our fishermen, however, have not yet commenced operations. And unless market conditions brighten, they will seek other avenues of employment. The season is advancing, only little over a month and a half remains, whereas last year packing commenced in October and was brisk throughout to the end of the year.—Western Star.

Work on Humber Commenced.

Alex. Cobb went to Grand Lake on Sunday's express to superintend operations there. Work commenced there on Monday. Among the first work will be the erecting of stores. The grading for the branch railway which will commence about 3 1/2 miles east of Grand Lake station and continue across Junction Brook. Four steam pile-drivers have arrived for use in piling the Brook for the dam. We understand as many men as possible will be taken on as opportunity offers. Work will also be commenced at Deer Lake.—Western Star.
