

Wellington Fall Assizes.

Before Mr. Justice Morrison.

STEWART vs. McTAGGART.

This case was partially reported yesterday. For the defence several witnesses were called, amongst others was Mr. Moyer, formerly a photographer in Fergus, who was thus hauled by Mr. Guthrie on cross-examination. When did you make the moonlight fitting from Fergus? I did not make a moonlight fitting; I left after seeing my creditors. Did not the matter get into the papers? No; I should like to see it if it did. Here the counsel handed witness a copy of the "Lightning Express" in which the witness was described as "having gone where the woodbine twineth," a paragraph that seemed to greatly amuse Judge and Jury, and to as greatly astonish witness, who seemed to have been previously unaware that he had been so poetically immortalized in print, and wished to know how the author of the paragraph derived his information that he intended to abscond. The witness was further asked if he was not arrested for obtaining goods on false pretences and had to appear before a magistrate in consequence in charge of a constable, to which the witness replied "No; the constable merely walked on ahead of him to the magistrate's."

PRESENTMENT OF GRAND JURY.

We have visited the jail and find it in a clean and comfortable condition, and the prisoners satisfied with their treatment. We find an insane man confined here and we recommend his removal to an asylum. We also find a breach in the jail yard wall, which we would recommend to be immediately repaired.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT IN NICHOL.—A young named Deveraux, living in the 13th concession, Nichol, met with a serious accident on Monday afternoon. He was engaged in rolling a heavy log, when it slipped and fell upon his leg, breaking both bones near the ankle joint. Dr. Griffith promptly adjusted the injury.

ST. ANDREW'S DAY.—At an adjourned meeting of the St. Andrew's Society, held on Monday night, it was decided to celebrate St. Andrew's Day on Friday, the 29th (the 30th falling on Saturday) by a Concert and Ball in the Town Hall. The well-known Fairbairn family, Scottish vocalists, have been engaged to give the concert, and they will present a programme which cannot fail to be acceptable to all true sons of Auld Scotland. Efficient committees have been appointed to make all the necessary arrangements for the Concert and Ball. The St. Andrew's celebrations in this town have always been popular and well attended, and we have little doubt the one this year will fully come up to, if not exceed, any yet held under the auspices of the Society. We will be able to give further particulars in a few days.

LADIES BENEVOLENT ASSOCIATION.—We are requested to state that the next meeting of this Association will be held at Mrs. Dr. Keating's, on Friday afternoon, at half-past two, p.m., when all ladies interested in the movement, whether members or not, are cordially invited to be present. The Association having completed a large lot of useful articles of clothing for Miss McPherson's Home, near Galt, are now engaged in work of a similar character for the poor of Guelph, and all who feel inclined to aid them in this charitable work are invited to cooperate. Besides providing clothing, &c. for the needy and deserving, poor of the town, during the winter months, it is also in contemplation to start and keep open during these months a soup kitchen, where good, wholesome soup would be served out daily to all who require it. The idea is an excellent one, and we hope that not only this but all other benevolent plans of the Association will be carried out by the active and unanimous cooperation of the ladies in the town.

what, and afterwards found them? Witness with naive simplicity replied, "Well that is a good one." (Loud laughter.) He denied the statement.

The next witness examined was Donald Campbell, weigher and shipper of grain for plaintiff, who displayed a far more intimate acquaintance with the details of his business than did his employer. From his and the plaintiff's evidence it was gathered that from the 3rd to the 25th of January last they had shipped 20 cars of grain to Elora, of which 19 only could be accounted for, the 20th being receipted in Henneberry's name. Mr. J. M. Fraser testified that he was in the habit of receiving grain in cars consigned to himself and sometimes in Gordon's name, and that the Railway employees always facilitated him when the grain came consigned to Gordon. He never authorized Henneberry to receive any grain from the station. Mr. Cameron examined these witnesses with one view amongst others, that the plaintiff must have received more grain in the railway cars acknowledged to him than he had received from the company stipulated to carry, it coming out in evidence that the plaintiff had overloaded the cars.
