A DUKE COMMITTED FOR DEBT

London, Nov. 24.—The Cambridge county court this morning made a commitment order on the Duke of Manchester, who was sued for a livery stable debt of 49 and costs. The order, however, was suspended for three weeks, with liberty to appeal.

SILLY STORY DENIED.

London, Nov. 24.—Inquiries made today in official circles regarding the report published in the Daily Graphic, to the effect that Great Britain contemplated ceding the Channel Islands to France, brought forth an emphatic denial of the whole story.

NEW ZEALAND TO VANCOUVER.

Wellington, N. Z., Nov. 24.—The premier, Sir John Seddon, proposes to subsidize an alternative fortnightly mail service between Wellington and Vancouver, B. C., the passage between the two cities, said Sir John, not to exceed nineteen days, and the passage between Wellington and Vancouver not to exceed 21 days.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT FOR IRELAND.

London, Nov. 24.—The Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, in the course of an important speech at Birmingham this evening on internal politics, said he expected that the greater part of the coming session of Parliament would be given to the consideration of the measure granting local government to Ireland.

THE GIRAFFE BROKE HIS NECK.

London, Nov. 24.—The Atlantic Transportation Company's steamship Massachusetts, which left New York on Nov. 12, for London, carrying as a cargo the greater part of the Giraffe, a giraffe, which was the property of the London Zoo, died of a heart attack today. Except on the first three days she had a smooth passage. A dispatch from Gravesend says that the giraffe died of a heart attack on the night of the 14th. Four horses also succumbed.

THE G. O. M. IN LONDON.

London, Nov. 24.—Mr. Gladstone arrived in London from Hawarden yesterday afternoon. The ex-premier is looking much better than was expected, and in spite of the disagreeable weather and the prevalence of a thick fog, a large crowd was assembled at the station to welcome him, and greet him with hearty cheers. Mr. Gladstone will start for Cannes on Friday. In the meantime he will consult physicians in regard to the congenital facial neuralgia from which he suffers.

AN ALL-IMPORTANT CONFERENCE.

London, Nov. 24.—There is widespread interest in the conference between the representatives of the employers and the delegates of the striking engineers, which commenced this morning behind closed doors, after many weeks of negotiations. The discussions are expected to be prolonged. The employers discussed the freedom of the management of their works without the interference of trades unions, and submitted a resolution on the subject embodying their views. The engineers submitted amendments to this resolution, and no agreement had been reached when the conference adjourned.

London's Fire Brigade Ahead of All.

London, Nov. 24.—The inhabitants of London, as a result of the outcry which followed the great fire of Friday last, are much gratified in regard to the alleged inefficiency of the fire brigade. At a meeting of the London County Council, the chairman of the fire brigade committee defended the organization of the London fire department, claiming it is ahead of that of New York, Montreal, and other cities, adding that every appliance used by the New York fire department is employed by the London fire brigade. He believed the London fire brigade had better engines and other appliances than were in use elsewhere. In spite of this, most damaging testimony has been furnished by a member of the firemen of Herring & Co., who have written a letter to the Times stating that the engines employed in extinguishing the flames at the great conflagration of Friday last were short of coal and water. Sir Eyre Massey Shaw, K.C.B., who was chief of the Metropolitan Fire Brigade, London, from 1861 to 1891, is quoted in an interview as saying that he has had the fire departments of New York, Chicago, Vienna, Berlin and Paris, and adds: "London is ahead of them all."

THE YACHT WHITE LADY.

London, Nov. 24.—The yacht White Lady, formerly the property of Mrs. Lily Langtry, has been sold at auction for \$50,000, to Lawson Johnston, who purchased the Prince of Wales' yacht Britannia. The vessel, cost to build for Lord Ashburton (Francis Edward Baring), \$200,000, and Mrs. Langtry spent \$100,000 in decorating the yacht and her suite of boudoirs. Mr. Johnston said today: "I shall take my family on a voyage to the Mediterranean in January, and, after the spring season, I shall go to Quebec and Montreal, and make a tour of the lakes. I have not yet decided whether I shall or shall not race the Britannia."

AUSTRIA'S ROWDY REICHSRATH.

Vienna, Nov. 24.—The members of the Lower House of the Reichsrath today excelled themselves in producing the most disgraceful scene yet witnessed in the branch parliament. The turbulence resulted from a motion that only one of a number of similar petitions against the ordinance making the Czech language coplanate with the German in Bohemia, should be read and printed. This order of the government has been the basis of the many uproarious scenes which have occurred during the past few weeks. The members of the left party today protested against the motion, stigmatizing it as oppressive and illegal. Finally the members of the lower house became so disorderly that the president was once more compelled to suspend the sitting. Wild scenes of disorder and a disgraceful scrimmage ensued, and it is believed that Herr Schoenerer, Wolf and Perocze will be arrested upon the charge of fighting in public. The house will meet again tomorrow.

"Old Boys, Welcome!"

The train conveying the "Old Boys" left Toronto about 2 p.m. with nearly 100 on board the special car provided for their accommodation. At London the party was joined by Hon. Edward Blake, who was heartily welcomed, and by about fifteen old Stratford boys resident in the Forest City.

ARRIVAL OF THE GUESTS.

An immense crowd awaited the train at Stratford, where it arrived about 7:30 p.m., being half an hour late. The crowd was entertained meanwhile by the I. O. O. F. Band, under Prof. Wm. Tomlinson. When the train reached the station, the old boys being poured out of their cars, massed on the platform. Waving flags aloft, they shouted lustily for Stratford, while the band played "There will be a hot time in the old town tonight." The old boys formed in line on Frank street, and headed by the band, marched up town and the cheers of the Stratforders. The visitors were soon surrounded by old friends and kept hand-shaking until the banquet. Hon. Edward Blake was driven to the residence of L. H. Smith, and Hon. George W. Ross to the house of his sister, Mrs. Geddes.

AT THE BANQUET.

The banquet proceedings were punctuated by the moment. At 8 o'clock the entire company was seated at a long table of the six tables extending the whole length of the auditorium, being filled with the guests. The table of the chairman and that of the first vice-chairman were placed on opposite sides of the hall. The Mayor of Stratford, seated at his right hand being Hon. Edward Blake and Mr. L. H. Smith, and at his left Dr. Stevenson, of Toronto, president of the Stratford Old Boys' association. The first vice-chairman was Mr. J. E. Wetherell, principal of the Stratford Collegiate Institute, and the second vice-chairman Mr. L. Rowland, banker. On Mr. Wetherell's right sat Mr. Calver, M.P., and on his left Mr. Jordan, Stratford. On Mr. Rowland's right sat Hon. George W. Ross, and on his left Rev. Mr. Fothergill, Stratford.
