THE BRIDGE ECANDAL S

A Profit, of \$244,000 for Government Contractors.

More Than Pouble the Cost - Expert Evidence-Haggart's Silly Questions. (Special to the ADVERTISER.)

OTTAWA, May 31. In the public accounts committee this morning the inquiry into the expenditure on the Wellington street and G. T. R. bridges over the Lachine Canal at Montreal was resumed. Mr. Roy, civil engineer, Montreal, continued his evidence. He went into the measurements and moneyed them out at prices which would give handsome profits to the contractor. He gave figures the same as the Government engineers and made liberal prices for all the work and made the outside cost of the work \$201,-000. The amount paid by the Government and the balance claimed by contractors was \$244,000 in excess of this sum.

Mr. Haggart put the witness through an examination to test his powers of calculation and his knowledge of prices of timber. He asked such questions as how many pounds in a square foot of limestone, what the weight of a square foot of ice was and so forth.
