STRATHROY FAIR

Hon. George W. Ross and Hon.
J. P. Whitney in Attendance.

Besides Other Well-Known Public Men
—The Show a Success—Results
of the Races.

Strathroy, Sept. 18.—It is estimated
that between 5,000 and 6,000 persons at-
tended the opening of the Union Fair
held here yesterday, a feature of the
occasion being the presence of Hon.
George W. Ross, premier of Ontario,
and Hon. J. P. Whitney, the opposition
leader in the Legislature.

At dinner Mr. Whitney was the
guest of Mr. J. H. English, the follow-
ing ladies and gentlemen being also
invited: Hon. George W. Ross, Mr.
Ross, Mr. W. S. Calvert, M.P., and
Mrs. Calvert, Sheriff Cameron, Mr.
Mal. Paul, Mayor Graham, Squire
Campbell, of Appin, and Mrs. Church.
After dinner this party took carriage
for the fair grounds, headed by the
Citizens' Band, where a temporary
platform was erected. On this the fol-
lowing gentlemen took seats: Hon.
Mr. Whitney, Hon. Premier Ross,
Major Beattie, M.P., Mr. W. S. Cal-
vert, M.P., Mr. Thomas Robert M.P.,
Squire Angus Campbell, Mr. J. F.
English, Mr. W. H. Taylor, M.P.,
for North Middlesex, and Mr. M. Mc-
Guigan, M.P. for South Middlesex, Mr.
Mal. Paul acting as chairman.

Mr. W. S. Calvert, M.P. for West
Middlesex, was called on to read the
address to Mr. Whitney, to which the
latter, though suffering from a severe
cold, made a happy response. He ex-
pressed great pleasure in being fel-
low present on the occasion, in a
rich county, that was represented in
the Local House by the premier of the
province, whom he thanked for doing
him the honor of being present where
he (as a public man) was a guest. He
told an anecdote of his early day
on the farm, and humorously alluded to
the fact that if he were to talk politi-
cs he had no doubt that Mr. Ross
could make it interesting.

Mr. Ross, who was a guest, felt
very well, and as he believed the
politicians would be in Strathroy in a
few days he would not occupy time on
this topic. He believed that in govern-
ment, and in the government of the

Windsor, Sept. 18.—At the prelimi-
nary trial of Levi Stewart, who was
hanged in Sandwich last February for
the murder of old Jim Ross, David
