LANDING GUNS AT CAPE TOWN

Precautionary Measures Taken in View of the Boer Invasion.

Martial Law Extended to Numerous Sections of Cape Colony—Kitchener Reports That Dewet Has Been "Headed Off"—Col. Halkett Makes a Good Haul.

Cape Town, Jan. 3.—The British battleship Monarch will land guns as a precautionary measure. The situation is undoubtedly serious. It is true that the Dutch have not in any considerable numbers joined the invaders, but a lack of arms is believed to be the true reason for abstention. In many places horses are freely offered and information readily supplied to the Boers. The latest reports show the situation to be generally as follows:

Kuruman, if still uninvested, probably soon will be. Griqualand West is filled with small parties of Boers, who are working south towards Prieska, for the purpose of co-operating with or supporting Commandant Hertzog, whose advance parties are in the neighborhood of Fraserburg. The Boers are close to Graaf Reinet, where of late the Dutch have given many demonstrations of extreme sympathy. In the eastern part of the colony the advance guard of the Boers is close to Maraisburg, about 25 miles northeast of Cradock.

The general opinion here is that the position is not properly appreciated in England. The Worcester conference excited the Dutch throughout the colony. Many old residents, who are by no means alarmists, regard a general uprising of the Dutch as quite likely.

MARTIAL LAW EXTENDED.

London, Jan. 3.—Martial law has been proclaimed in the Worcester-shire, Ceres, Prince Albert, Fraserburg and Sutherland divisions, says the Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail, writing yesterday. The Boers retired.

At every camp we passed the men turned out to cheer us. The general and his staff came down to see us off, but arrived too late. He sent word after by the C. M. R., who were on the train following, expressing regret that he had not been able to say good-bye to us personally.

THE STRATHCONAS.

Lieut.-Col. Steele, commanding Strathcona Horse, reports to the department, under date of Nov. 27, that the regiment was re-horsed at Pretoria on Oct. 29. On Oct. 25 the regiment formed part of a column to reinforce the 6th Brigade, under command of Col. Hicks, of the Dublin Fusiliers. We arrived at Fredericksd. before noon, when Gen. Barton attacked with the Royal Welsh and Scottish Fusiliers a large force of Boers hidden in a drugga, and who had been trying for some days to cut off the water supply of the force. The Boers left 60 killed and wounded on the field, and in addition, 23 prisoners were taken. The regiment took part in a number of operations out of Fredericksd. necessary for the opening of the railway through to Potchefstroom. Our important movement took place on the flank, when the regiment was ordered out of Fredericksd. for the purpose of holding the plain extending along the Gatsrand Pass, but the plan miscarried.

The regiment brought in on this day 600 head of cattle and 12,000 head of sheep. On the 11th of November, referring to the operations of the previous day, Gen. Barton said he could not speak too highly of the practical and efficient manner in which the duty assigned to the corps was carried out by all. The casualties were: Pte. Read, who escaped, and Sergt. Duncan, who, by an accident, fell from a horse, and fractured a leg. At Macmahon's station, Pte. Stewart, one of the scouts, showed great presence of mind, fatally wounding one Boer with his revolver, and had another covered, but the pistol missed fire, and he was wounded, though not dangerously. Since then the regiment had been furnishing patrols guarding the railway.

DEWET HEADED OFF.

London, Jan. 2.—The war office has received the following dispatch from Lord Kitchener:

"Dewet tries to move toward Bethlehem, but was headed off by Picher and retreated toward Lindley or Retz."

BOERS REPULSED.
