DISFRANCHISEMENT OF ALABAMA NEGROES
Purpose of the New Constitution To Be Submitted for Ratification

Montgomery, Ala., Nov. 10.—Tomorrow (Monday) the citizens of Alabama will vote for the ratification of the new constitution of the state, formed by the late constitutional convention. The calling of the constitutional convention was a measure of the Democratic party. Many prominent Republicans favor the adoption of the new organic law, while many influential Democrats are opposing it. The purpose of the disfranchisement of the negro, and at the same time to leave the ballot in the hands of every white man in the state. The best information indicates that the new constitution will carry by a majority exceeding 25,000.

WOMEN WITH SALARIES.
Washington, Nov. 10.—Over 8,000 women are employed in the various government offices here, 2,044 of whom have entered the service after competitive examination. Nine hundred of them have paid salaries ranging from \$1,000 to \$1,800 a year, the others being paid the compensation of ordinary clerks—\$600 to \$900 a year.

FORCED TO FIGHT

German Officer's Apology Refused—Fatal Duel on the Eve of His Wedding.

Berlin, Nov. 10.—The public mind was considerably excited last week on account of a duel at Insteburg, East Prussia, in which Lieut. Blaskowitz, of the army, was killed by Lieut. Hildebrand, also of the army.

Lieuts. Hildebrand and Rasmussen met Lieut. Blaskowitz going home one night in a state of intoxication, carried him to a spot near his residence and left him there. They returned to the spot later, however, and found Lieut. Blaskowitz crouching against a wall, asleep, and tried to arouse him and get him upon his feet. Blaskowitz, being ignorant of the identity of the two men who were endeavoring to assist him, struck right and left in his semi-somnolent state and hit Lieut.

Hildebrand. The latter considered himself insulted by the blow received and reported the affair to the court of honor, which decided that a duel was unavoidable, whereupon Lieut. Hildebrand challenged Lieut. Blaskowitz.

The latter, unconscious of what had occurred while he was intoxicated, went to the house of a young lady whom he was to marry on the following day. When a telegram recalling him to meet Hildebrand was received, it was too late to settle the matter with an apology, but the highest officers of brigade and division sanctioned the finding of the court of honor, that a duel was necessary.

Newspapers of all shades of opinion express amazement at the action of the court of honor. It is expected that the case will come before the Reichstag.

SEVERE EARTHQUAKE.
Constantinople, Nov. 10.—A severe earthquake occurred Friday at Erzeroum. Many of the houses were destroyed and the inhabitants sought safety in the open.

G. T. J. FLOURISHING.
Montreal, Nov. 10.—F. V. Gilderson, chairman of the Avonmouth Dock Company, has just finished an inspection of the Grand Trunk system for the directors in England. He finds the railway in splendid condition, and states that Messrs. Hays and Reeve have increased the value of the company's securities to the extent of 15,000,000 pounds sterling.

FOG HURT LONDON PLAYHOUSES.
London, Nov. 10.—The fog played havoc with the theatrical business last week. On Monday evening the London houses were playing to \$500 below normal business, and everywhere the attendances were woefully attenuated.

A "SCORCHER" FROM LONDON, ENG., NEWS.
Death Rate in South African Concentration Camps Worse Than in Famine-Smitten India.

London, Nov. 9.—The Daily News today exhaustively surveys the concentration camps in South Africa, with the following conclusion: "The truth is that the death rate in the camps is incomparably worse than anything in India or Asia can show. There is nothing to match it even in the mortality figures of the Indian famines, where cholera and other epidemics have to be taken into account. Statistics are produced in order to prove this assertion."

"The government's advertisement for teachers to the camp children, setting forth that 'the term for teachers will be one year certain,' is prominently displayed as evidence that the authorities have no intention of ending the wholesale destruction of human beings."

The Daily News urges all humane men not to wait for official reports, but to insist "on the camps being broken up and the people distributed among their friends, or removed to districts where a fresh attempt can be made, under competent organization, to save the remainder of the population of life."

FAST TYPESETTING.
Compositor Puts Up 84,500 Ems on a Linotype Machine in Eight Hours.

Dayton, Ohio, Nov. 10.—A remarkable record on the linotype machine was made on a Thursday in the office of the Daily News, when Claude Couser set 3,250 lines of nonpareil linotype compositing, making a total of 84,500 ems in eight hours.

The machine was speeded to 7 lines a minute. To secure this result it was necessary to touch the keys 109,000 times, or nearly
