#### HICKS PREDICTS STORMY JANUARY

Heavy Gales, Thunderstorms and Blizzardous Cold.

CONSIDERABLE SNOW AND SLEET

Will Be Necessary to Figure On Thaws and Frosts-and It's All On Account of Venus.

St. Louis, Jan. 2.—The following are Rev. Irl. R. Hicks' weather forecasts for the month of January, 1904: Winter thunderstorms on and touching the 4th should be no surprise, and a rapid and violent change to high barometer, high northwesterly gales and very cold, should be counted on in the immediate rear of the storm areas. In proportion as the temperature rises and the barometer falls, during the first stages of this period, look for change to high barometer and blizzardous cold, as the storm center shifts to the east. Shelter should be sought
