

Increase in Our Export Trade With Britain.

**A Decrease in Canadian Imports—
Vital Difference Between Balfour's
and Chamberlain's Ideas.**

London, Oct. 8.—The Liverpool Daily Post, on Liverpool as a fruit distribution centre, says that this season's first arrivals of Nova Scotia apples have brought phenomenal prices, realizing 24 shillings the barrel for best grades.
