An entirely new addendum has been made to rule 4 for stroke competitions by the U. S. G. A. committee, the need of which has been made apparent by an appeal from a club as to the penalty when a player has returned a medal score lower than SIMCOE LOST GAME has returned a file has never been actually made. shall be the loss of the hole. Penalties to rule 14 fixed by the U G. A. are loss of the hole at match play and two strokes at medal play. The remainder of the interpretation defines a water hazard and is copied from the 1903 book.
