## JOHN C. ELLIOTT TO TORONTO LIBERALS

"Better To Be Right and Lose Than  
To Be Wrong and Win."

"It is better to be right and lose  
than to be wrong and win. This  
Government, which, when its members  
were in Opposition, talked so loudly  
of the extravagance of the Lib-  
erals, spent eight and a half millions  
last year, a sum greatly in excess of  
the largest Liberal yearly expendi-  
ture. This was how in a brief, crisp  
and chummy speech Mr. John C. El-  
liott, M. P. for West Middlesex, en-  
courage the members of the Young  
Liberals at their clearing Friday  
night in the Temple Buildings, Toron-  
to. It was not, he continued, so much  
the desire to win elections as to edu-  
cate the people to deal with their  
problems. He said that the Lib-  
erals should clearly differentiate be-  
tween the party and the principles they  
stood for, which should occupy the present  
attention of the Young Liberals. It  
was certain that the Liberals could  
never have held power so long as they  
did had they not been worthy of the  
confidence of the people. He said that  
the party now in power made a good  
Opposition, and he was one of those  
who thought they would still be better  
in Opposition, but the party should  
otherwise. Such clubs as that of the  
Young Liberals should ascertain what  
the questions to be dealt with are  
the best plan to deal with them. A  
work would be more to the advantage  
of the province than any plan of  
Ontario. For instance, the  
Provincial government, which is  
closely in touch with the people than  
even the Dominion, for the laws relat-  
ing to property and civil rights were  
administered by the province. Those  
included education, municipal gov-  
ernment, the licensing question and  
the police. All of the greatest im-  
portance, and it was a good thing for  
such clubs to debate these matters.

On motion of Mr. A. G. Ross, se-  
conded by Mr. Joseph Mulrooney, Mr.  
Elliott was cordially thanked for his  
excellent address.

Mr. J. C. Allen, of the First Ward  
Liberal Club, and Mr. W. Banks, sen.,  
also spoke briefly.

## HEBREWS CELEBRATE FEAST OF PURIM

One of the Most Important Observ-  
ances in Jewish Calendar.

The Feast of Purim, one of the most  
popular events in the Jewish calendar,  
was observed in Hebrew churches  
throughout the world yesterday. In  
the local synagogues there was a large  
attendance, and as the feast is ob-  
served in remembrance of the over-  
throw of the plans of Haman for ex-  
terminating the Jews, the Scripture  
readings were exclusively from the  
Book of Esther. The escape of the  
Jews from the terrible fate Haman had  
planned for them always appeals par-  
ticularly to the Hebrews, as they feel  
that events of a similar nature may  
at any time befall their countrymen.  
The feast is also observed outside  
the synagogues, and in the homes  
there is a general celebration,  
and gifts are frequently exchanged and  
donations made to the poor. The feast  
is so arranged that it can never fall  
on the Jewish Sabbath, which is Sat-  
urday.

## PROF. C. R. DRUM ON "AN HONEST MAN"

Addressed Large Audience in Auditor-  
ium on Sunday.

Yesterday afternoon Prof. C. R.  
Drum, of Syracuse, N. Y., spoke before  
a mass meeting of men that crowded  
the Y. M. C. A. auditorium. His sub-  
ject was "An Honest Man." "One of  
the most frequent excuses that I have  
met in my work is this, that if I have  
lives a decent life and pays his honest  
debts he will be saved. I can agree  
with this statement, so we will con-  
sider what constitutes an honest man  
—a man who meets all his obligations.  
First, an honest man owes everyone  
the benefit of the doubt. If an evil  
story gets abroad about anyone, first,  
be wholly sure that it is true, and  
then keep silent about it. Then a man  
owes his wife and family a greater  
debt of consideration than he often  
pays.  
A man owes to his family, or his  
family to be, the debt of a clean life,  
and the debt of a firm stand on mat-  
ters of religion.  
And above all, he owes a debt of  
loyalty and service to God—and these  
are the standards on which a man's  
honesty are to be judged.
