London, Nov. 22. - The political campaign is being waged with a ierceness almost unknown in England, both by politicians on the stump, and suffragettes on the battlefield.

The battle of Downing street, which was fought Tuesday afternoon, when several hundred suffragettes attempted to storm the premier's residence, assaulted Mr. Asquith and Augustine Birrell, chief secretary for Ireland, and broke many windows in the Government offices, surpassed al previous spectacles of the sort. About 150 women and several men supporters are in the police station.

Following an announcement by the prime minister in the House of Commons that if he were still in power at the next session of Parliament, the Government would give facilities for the consideration of a suffrage large body of women, inflamed rather than placated by this promise, which was characterized as "nothing more nor less than an insult to the cause," left Caxton Hall in search of the premier.
