He at once began to look into matters, and after investigation he could find no justification for expenditure of this amount of money. Con sequently he notified the water com mission on Tuesday, and through that body the parks commission, that this money could not be expended, and advised them to cease work.

The commissioners heeded his advice, and that is the reason nothing at all is being done. Where the money is to come from is the puzzling question at this time.

The expenditure already made have to come out of some fund. The water commissioners cannot utilize any of the surplus of that department. The parks commission is limited to the expenditure of one-half a mill on the dollar. Most of that has been appropri-The city hall staff is puzzling about the money.

Had No Authority.

"The city solicitor stopped the expenditure of this money," declared Ald. Richter, chairman of the finance committee. "The council had no authority to pass the bylaw setting aside \$15,000, and Mr. Meredith told them so According to the act, the parks commission can expend one-half a mill for parks improvements. They can spend no more, and when they asked for a bylaw to spend \$15,000 they exceeded their authority. I understand that they have quit the special work in hand. So far as I see now the money already expended will have to be charged up to the one-half mill allowed for parks purposes. That is all they can tribute, and this amount will have to bear the burden. It may keep them busy meeting the expenditure, but they will have to do it.

Secure Money Elsewhere. In the meantime, the parks commis sioners are wondering what is to be done. They will not discuss the matter very freely, having come to the conclusion that the money necessary to carry out their schemes had better be

Guelph, Sept. 11.-Consideration of the resolution committee's report furnished lively topics for debate at the Trades and Labor Congress this morning. The first resolution, covering the grievances of the letter-carriers, were carried unanimously after Delegate Swertz, Victoria, had painted a pathetic picture of the conditions of these servants, especially in the west. They asked 50 cents per day increase, pay when sick, an 8-hour day, and decided not to prosecute the protest better uniforms to be made locally in union shops. Delegate Swerts said the poorest laborer working on the Essex, will also be dropped.

Inter-Union Fight. The fight-between the Amalgamated Carpenters of Montreal and the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners was brought before the convention in a resolution by N. Arcaud, of Mon-treal, asking that the Amalgamated Society of Carpenters be not recognized by the congress.
