French Secure Plans of New German Gun

Draughtsman Stole Copy of Krupp Weapon To Be Used Against Aeroplanes.

Paris, July 7. - The French army authorities who recently got possession of Germany's airship secrets when the Zeppelin dirigible landed in Luneville, have succeeded in getting the plans devised by the Krupps for a to be used against aeroplanes. While it is not admitted directly by the French minister of war, or by the police, it is clear from the story given out here that the French authorities know all the details of the newest aeroplane gun, and undoubtedly will proceed to manufacture one them-

elves or improve on it. The fact became public yesterday when the police here told of a Ger-man named Rudowsky who applied at police station for aid in finding friends here, and also for food. The man carried a satchel, and finally, through an interpreter, he admitted he had walked all the way from Ger-many, carrying with him the drawings of the gun. He said he had worked as a draughtsman in the Krupp gun works. He had a companion, he said, who had made \$2,000 y selling secrets of the Krupp works, and he thought he might make money himself by selling secrets to the French Government. He said he could not gain admission to the French minister of war, but the impression here is that the Krupp secret is held by the French Government.

CALL FOR HELP WAS FLASHED BY STR. ATHABASCA

Big C. P. R. Steamer Went Aground on Small Island In Lake Huron.

All Passengers Were Taken Off Safely a Few Hours Later.

Owen Sound, July 6. - In a dense early morning fog the Canadian Pacific steamship Athabasca stranded on the Bear's Camp Rump, a small island in the straits between Lake Huron and Georgian Bay. By means of her wireless apparatus she was able to call for assistance and consequently seven hours later her 225 passengers had been transferred by lighter to the Asiniboia, to continue their journey to Port McNicoll.

The vessel struck at about 5 o'clock

on Saturday morning when the passengers were in their berths. The lake was calm and the Athabasca remained on an even keel, and no panic ensued. A call for assistance by wireless brought the Assiniboia, belonging to the same line, from Port McNicoll, and the tug Harrison, with lighter, from Owen Sound. At 2:30 p.m. the passengers, among whom were many women and children, were transferred from the Athabasca to the Assinibola without mshap. They arrived in Port McNicoll at 9:15 p.m. or about nine hours late.

The Athabasca was only slightly ut of her course and was easily reeased by the lightering of a scow-oad of the flour, which, with a quantity of grain, formed her cargo. She was then able to run under her own
