THREATEN A STRIKEMotormen and Conductors at
Border Agitated.

WINDSOR, Sept. 14.—The presen-
tation of a petition, signed by more
than a hundred motormen and conduc-
tors of the Sandwich, Windsor and
Amherstburg Railway, requesting a
substantial increase in wages, will be
made tomorrow to Manager James An-
derson by representatives of the men.The present scale is 25 cents per
hour for men, and 28 cents for con-
ductors. Employees are now asking
that this be increased to 32 and 35
cents. Unless these terms are met
the men threaten to strike.The petition was circulated by Con-
ductor Lucien Salvo, and, according
to one of the employees, Salvo was
dismissed when he attempted to place
the demands before Manager Ander-
son, early this morning. Another con-
ductor, E. Joseph Fields, stated that
his name was taken from a list of em-
ployees by Superintendent McLeod,
after he had signed a petition for a
raise."It is necessary for us to shelve
daily, clean our shoes, purchase uni-
forms to comply with regulations,"
said one conductor, "we cannot do this
on the present wages paid."Officials of the company denied that
there was any danger of a strike,
and refused to discuss the alleged dis-
sent of Conductors Salvo and Fields.

THE LOCAL MARKET

The local market today was small,
even for Friday. This was due chiefly
to the cool weather, and the fact that
many of the farmers are attending the
fair.

A number of loads of hay were brought
in, selling briskly at \$12 to \$14 a ton.
Straw was scarce, and sold for \$8 and
\$8.50 a ton. Oats, too, were scarce,
selling for \$1.55 to \$1.62 a cwt. for old,
and \$1.60 to \$1.68 for new. Barley was
firm at \$1.87 a cwt. Wheat sold fairly
briskly at \$1.87 to \$2.08 a cwt.

Potatoes were steady at \$1.40 to \$2.25.
Tomatoes had a wide range of prices,
coming from 25c to 40c a basket. Most
of them brought 35c. Cabbages were of-
fered at \$1.50 a cwt. But some brought \$3.75
to \$4 a cwt. Small pigs, however, were
steady at \$12 to \$15 a pair. Dressed hogs
were firm at \$15 to \$15.50. Veal was sold
at \$11 to \$16 a cwt, and beef at \$11 to
\$12.50.
