DEPORTED RADICALS FROM U. S. WELCOMED BY RUSSIAN REDS

700 ARRESTED IN SEATTLE IN BIG DRIVE TO BREAK BACKBONE OF BOLSHEVISM IN NORTHWEST

Raids Carried Out by Department of Justice Agents and Seattle Police—Number of I. W. W. Members Gathered In by Authorities—200 at Least Will Face Deportation.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 20.—Department of justice agents and Seattle police last night arrested more than 700 persons on deportation warrants. Officers said the raids were intended to "break the backbone of radical activities in the northwest," and were part of a new national campaign against reds. Many of the men taken were released after examination at the United States immigration detention station, but officers said they expected at least 200 suspects would face deportation hearings. A number of I. W. W. were included among those arrested.

SULTAN OF TURKEY HOPES FOR A PEACE WITH ALLIES THAT WILL MEAN WITHDRAWAL OF TROOPS

Upholds Turkey's Right To Political Existence in Address Issued To His People—Declares War's Reverses Cannot Injure Right of Country To A Place in the World.

Constantinople, Saturday, Jan. 17.—Turkey's right to political existence is upheld in an address issued to the people today by the sultan. Hope is expressed that the peace to be concluded with the Entente powers will be one of dignity and will result in the retirement of allied forces who are at present holding portions of the empire. "Right dominates everything and nothing can destroy it," the address declares. "The reverses of war cannot injure a nation's right to political existence as long as its legislative and executive functions maintain close collaboration and unite their efforts toward safeguarding the rights and interests of the state. I hope it will be possible, by divine grace, to secure a peace safeguarding the unity of our empire as well as the honor and dignity of the nation, and assuring the deliverance of our invaded provinces."

CHURCHES HELP TO RAISE FUND FOR ARMENIANS

Alliance Here Has Begun a Campaign To Assist the Starving.

TREASURER APPOINTED
Press Will Publish Lists of Donations As They Are Received.

Armenians are starving to death by thousands and in spite of all appeals for aid, the money, food and clothing donated for them are not enough to meet the absolute necessities.

Moved by these conditions, the Ministerial Alliance of London decided to arrange a campaign for subscriptions to raise relief fund and with that end in view approached Nathaniel Mills of the Dominion Savings Company and requested him to take the position of official treasurer or subscription receiver for the city. Mr. Mills consented and will accept gratefully all donations and forward them to headquarters through banks which will make the transfers without cost to the fund.

Churches will co-operate in this campaign by setting aside days for special collections which will go to the Armenians. New St. George's Presbyterian church has given its donation, amounting to about \$200, and St. Andrew's has set aside next Sunday for the special offering. Other churches will set their dates immediately.

The local press has been asked and has consented to print the lists of subscriptions as received and these will be supplied regularly by Mr. Mills.

FORMER GOVERNOR PLACED ON TRIAL

Montpelier, Vt., Jan. 20.—Former Governor H. P. Grainger today was tried on charges of embezzlement and larceny of state money during the time he served as state auditor from 1903 to 1917.

The indictment alleges that Mr. Grainger as auditor drew his personal checks against state funds and that the payments were carried along as state expenditures. The total amount involved was set at \$24,755, of which more than \$15,000 has been repaid.

UNIONISTS ARE DEFEATED.
Londonderry, Ireland, Jan. 20.—The Unionists of Londonderry were defeated in the municipal elections of last week. As a result the new municipal council will be composed of 19 Unionists as against 21 Sinn Feiners, or nationalists.

SHIP DE VALERA AND HIS "BANDITS" BACK TO IRELAND

Chicago, Jan. 20.—Warning that "the government of the United States should not interfere with the domestic problems of a friendly power," was given yesterday by Rev. Louis Crooks. He is the church of Ireland representative on the delegation of Protestants from Ulster now touring this country.

When asked by the Right Rev. Sheldon M. Griswold, suffragan bishop of Chicago, what the solution to the problem was, he answered: "Seven years of firm, impartial and honest administration of the law."

"The Sinn Fein are through and through Bolsheviks," he said, "and we are dealing with Bolshevism."

"DeValera and his gang of bandits should be deported," said the Hon. William Cote, member of parliament. Mr. Cote protested against the mission of DeValera, termed the "president of the Irish republic," and asked that "DeValera and his bunch of bandits be placed on a ship and returned to Ireland."

PRIVY COUNCIL GRANTS APPEAL OF TORONTO RY.

Ontario Railway Board's Penalty of \$24,000 Is Reversed.

BOARD IS CRITICIZED
Corporation Wins in Action to Make Company Pay For Snow Cleaning.

London, Jan. 20.—(By the Canadian Press.) Important points concerning the powers of the Ontario railway board were enunciated by the privy council today. Their lordships allowed the appeal in the case of the Ontario Railway vs. the Corporation of the City of Toronto, reversing the order of the railway board, ordering the appellants to pay the respondents \$24,000, being at the rate of \$1,000 daily during the time which the company failed to provide cars. Their lordships think the board authorized to impose penalties for non-compliance with its orders, but subject to the condition that such penalties must be imposed as follows:

For the purpose of enforcing compliance "with these orders and not to summary imposition of a penalty for a past breach without previous warning, but as the imposition of a penalty in advance of the order of the board, and for the purpose of procuring obedience to the orders."

PERU WILL SUBMIT CONTROVERSY WITH CHILI TO LEAGUE

Santiago, Chili, Jan. 20.—Peru will submit to the League of Nations her controversy with Chili over the territories of Tacna and Arica, which are the next choice," said Col. 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LAST NIGHT COLDEST IN TWO YEARS; WAS 46 BELOW FREEZING

Barometer Hints It May Get Colder.

MANY EARS ARE FROZEN
Those Who Were Out Late or Early Feel Effects Today.

Zowie! But this gets the ears. And a good many were frozen last night. To say nothing of the numbers of people who went to work this morning with an enlarged nose. Cheeks were also frozen and at least a few railway men suffered frost-bitten fingers.

It was fourteen degrees below zero during the night. The thermometer at the official weather observatory in South London, said so. Those who live in the north end of the city, however, claim that it was at least 40 below in that part of the city. The severe cold was followed by an east wind this morning, and rumor has it that every cold man was a smile a yard long.

Climbed Rapidly.
Last night was the coldest in two years, but the mercury rose rapidly this morning, and by eight o'clock had reached six above the zero mark. It continued to climb until this afternoon. On the fifth of February, 1918, the thermometer registered 21 degrees below zero, and not since then has London experienced as severe weather as last night. The coldest recorded in January of that year was eleven below, this point being reached on the 20th of the month.

At no time during last winter did the thermometer at the official observatory drop below the zero mark. On the 12th of January, 1918, the coldest recorded was eight above. Last night was the coldest in January in several years, according to the old timers, some of whom now admit that their prophecy for an open winter is "all shot."

One Train Canceled.
The severe cold did not noticeably interfere with railway traffic, as the majority of trains were no later than usual today. The morning train to Wingham was canceled today. A train came down from that town this morning, which was only a hour late.

This story is not written by a passenger, neither is it unfilled for the purpose of cheering up the coal dealers. But the truth of the matter is that the barometer indicates a further drop in temperature, and the Ontario weather bureau promises strong winds and colder weather for tomorrow.

\$900 DAMAGES GIVEN PLAINTIFF IN JURY ACTION

Mrs. Probyn Asked \$5,000 For Death of Husband.

Mrs. Sarah Probyn was given \$900 damages against Wesley Harrison in the verdict read this morning at the courthouse by Judge R. M. Meredith, chief justice of the common pleas. Mrs. Probyn asked for \$5,000 damages, claiming that her husband had died as a result of injuries sustained when Arthur Harrison, driving his father's motor car, had crashed with the mail car Probyn was driving on the night of March 12, 1918.

The case went to the jury last night, and a sealed verdict was rendered at 11 o'clock.

Today the judge and jury are occupied with a criminal case, that of Benjamin West, a Nassau Township farmer, who is charged with a serious offence against a 16-year-old girl, who went to his house on June 1st asking for donations to the Salvation Army. Crown Prosecutor E. J. Toronto is conducting the case for the crown, while M. McEvoy and Edmund Meredith, K.C., are looking after West's interests. It is expected that the case will be concluded this afternoon.

BELIEVES THE DUTCH WILL NEVER GIVE UP EX-KAISER WILHELM

Von Lersner Expresses Opinion That Allies Will Never Get Former Emperor.

Paris, Jan. 20.—Dissatisfaction at the efforts of the Allies to get former Emperor William out of Holland proved successful, was expressed today by Baron Kurt von Lersner, Germany's chief representative here.

"I am absolutely sure that the Dutch Government will never surrender to the Allies, and that they will never give up the emperor," he said.

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ASKS PROHIBITIVE TAX ON ALL FOREIGN MAGAZINES HAVING 10,000 CIRCULATION IN CANADA

Resolution To Be Discussed by the United Boards of Trade Here—Premier E. C. Drury Expected To Speak At Annual Meeting.

Premier E. C. Drury in all probability will be the chief speaker at the second annual meeting of the United Boards of Trade of Western Ontario, which is to be held here February 5 and 6. The Ontario premier is scheduled to arrive in London at 10 o'clock on the Friday evening session, which will be held in the V. C. auditorium.

The discussion on the rate of exchange between Canada and the United States, the premier, in the opinion of officers of the various organizations. This subject will be introduced by George S. The delegates to the annual meeting will be the guests of the city at a luncheon at the Hotel Windsor, Monday, February 6. The council will be the host at the dinner and Hon. C. S. Briggs, provincial minister of public works, will be the principal speaker. An invitation is also being extended to representatives of farmers' clubs and municipal and township councils.

Dr. J. L. Lipson, director of bureau of agricultural research at Detroit, will speak on "Commission-Managed Farming." The meeting will be held on Thursday evening session.

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
