The pearl, a lovely specimen of the fresh water variety, was one of the two found in the river Thames a year or so ago.

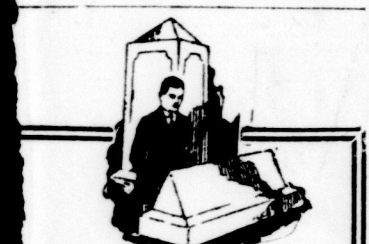
Presented With Watch.

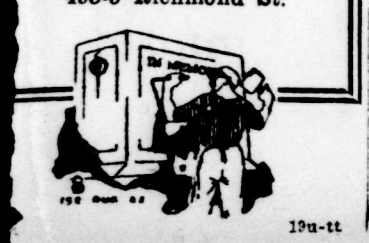

PERMITS CITY WOMEN TO VOTE UNDER NEW LAW

At the next civic election all women who have an interest in property with their husbands will for the first time in this city be allowed to cast a ballot without the husband being compelled to go to the expense of securing a joint ownership deed. A resolution to this effect was passed by the city council in November, 1921, and subsequently became law, and ex-Ald. Wm. Wilson has advanced the claim that he was the member of the city council of that day who was primarily responsible for this legislation.

"I introduced that motion," he declared Saturday, "and it was adopted by the council, and comes into effect next December."

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RETURN AFTER 800-MILE CYCLE TOUR

William McLeod and William Moffat, of City, Enjoy Long Trip.

Completing a bicycle tour of more than 800 miles, William McLeod and William Moffat, two East London youths, returned to this city Friday, with the unique experience of having to contend with one puncture only, in the manner of trouble on their trip.

McLeod and Moffat planned to spend their two weeks' holidays on a bicycle tour, and their itinerary included Chatham, Windsor, Detroit, Toledo, Cleveland, Buffalo, Niagara Falls, Toronto, and was 113 miles, although for few nights spent with relatives in Jeanette's Creek, Detroit and Buffalo, the boys camped in the open whenever the weather permitted, during the entire eleven days of their trip.

They report the roads to be in excellent condition in Western Ontario, and across the border, particularly the paved stretch of highway from Detroit to Cleveland. Encountering a storm at Chatham, and another near Hamilton, was part of the hazard which went to make the trip an ideal holiday venture.

The two cyclists also report that the residents along the route of their tour were very cordial toward them, and that one puncture was the only mishap of the trip.
