

Takes Normal Students On Voyage With Norman Duncan On Ice, Sea, Land

A voyage on sea, ice and land took what was required from the students of the London Normal School yesterday, when they were conducted through very realistic adventures by the price of make believe, P. W. Hayden, of Toronto.

Giving a lecture under the auspices of the department of education, Mr. Hayden, who has frequently delighted London audiences with his journey with masters of literature, chose for his interpretative reading, "A Beat T Harbor" and "The Evolution of Satan's Trap." In the latter he gripped the audience with the lesson intended by the author, the late Norman Duncan, that the region of peace by the law of supply and demand is "devil's doctrine."

The student-teacher audience and members of the staff as well as the school, were well lived and endured with the hero, Jehoshaphat Radd, his grim experiences when the fisher folk of the stretch of coast, reduced to a wretched state, were to buy flour from the villain, John Wood. "Prices have gone sky-high," said "a barrel," announced the villain.

Jehoshaphat would not buy at that price, but, with men of the settle-

ment, returned some days later and took what was required from the storehouse, paying in due time a reasonable price.

"There came a day of revenge, when John Wood floated out to sea on an iceberg," Jehoshaphat followed with his boat, calmly announcing that he would rescue, but "labor had gone up sky-high." A thoroughly repentant villain agreed to make restitution for the much wrong he had done his neighbors before he had agreed to save his life.

"And in three years the villain had the coast folk back exactly in the same position, under his heel again." A modern schooner was used to illustrate the nautical terms of "A Beat T Harbor."

The lecturer touched briefly upon the life of Norman Duncan, the Canadian author, born in Brantford in 1871, who early felt the lure of the sea, which could be cruel and ruthless, according to the author's own words, as they came from the lips of the old man who had lived the whole life as a lighthouse keeper.

Norman Duncan, Mr. Hayden termed "the Dickens of Canada," in his love for the sea and the power of human nature and remarkable power of characterization.

WAITING FOR GARMENTS FOR T. B. PATIENTS

Nurses Report Much Sickness and Need To Women's Sanatorium Aid.

Largely increased need this winter of the social service side of the work was reported by the tuberculosis nurses, Misses Foster and Raymond, to the Women's Sanatorium Aid at the meeting held yesterday afternoon at the home of Mrs. B. C. McCann, Central Avenue. The number of patients on their visiting list at the present time is 489, a large number of these children.

Several young people have been sent to the preventorium, and such has been the demand for accommodation there that a waiting list has been necessary. Unemployment of breadwinners, coupled with the cold and uncertain weather, have contributed to the need, as well as making more necessary the services of the nurses. An appeal was made for warm underwear, old garments that may be given down for the children. These can be sent to the supervising nurse, Miss Hanson.

In addition to warm clothing, milk and other food, it was necessary to supply an unusually large amount of fuel, hence it was anticipated expenses would be usually high this winter.

Forty-eight baskets of Christmas cheer were distributed. Mrs. John Stevely presided over the affair, which was largely attended. Afternoon tea was served by the hostess at the close.

Coming from China just three months ago, he is clearly in touch with political developments there.
