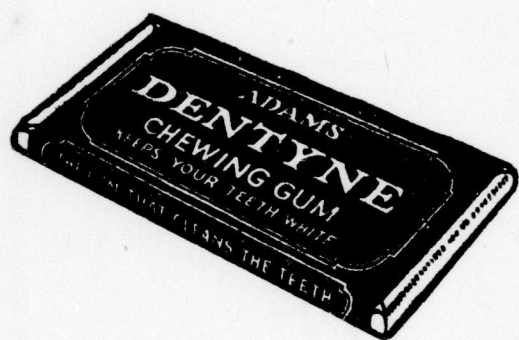

OVERSEASE EVIDENCE ARRIVES FOR USE IN \$500,000 ACTION

Imposing Looking Document
Brings Testimony From Score
Now Abroad.

CLAIMS 1,000 SHARES

William Robins Seeks To Have
Hiram Walker's First Will
Recognized.

Windsor, May 15.—The feature at today's session of the Sandwich assizes before Mr. Justice H. W. Mowat was the arrival from England of an imposing-looking document, bound with much red tape. This, it was confidentially announced by counsel for the Walker heirs, was the evidence collected abroad from a score or more of witnesses to be used in the half-million dollar action being brought by William Robins of London, Eng., against the beneficiaries of the estate of the late E. Chandler Walker, head of the great distilling firm of Hiram Walker Sons, Ltd., of Walkerville.

Mr. Walker died eight years ago, and his will divided his huge estate among many beneficiaries. Mr. Robins claims that he was ignored in the last will of the multi-millionaire distiller, and that a clause in a previous will made by Mr. Walker, gave him one thousand shares of stock in the distilling company. Present estimates place the value of one thousand shares of Walker stock at something more than half a million dollars. Mr. Robins, therefore, brings action to have the first will recognized rather than the second one. Robins for nearly a quarter of a century was general manager for the Walkers. He resigned in 1912, and has since resided in England.

Robins was on the stand all day yesterday and again today, undergoing examination and then cross-examination at the hands of half a score of some of the most brilliant counsel at the Canadian Bar. Three physicians testified yesterday concerning the illness to the flesh to which the late Mr. Walker was subject, or imagined he was subject to. According to their testimony, the Walkerville multi-millionaire liked to have doctors visit him so he could talk to them about his own case. One witness, Dr. C. W. Hoare of Walkerville, said that in a period of eighteen years his records showed he had made 1,167 visits to the late Mr. Walker.

The courtroom was packed both yesterday and today, but there seemed a distinct air of disappointment over the fact that none of the notables who expected to appear had put in an appearance. That, evidence, it is expected, will be introduced by commission.

CLAUSE INSERTED IN BRANCH BILLS

Accepted by Canadian National in Substitution of Amendment Yesterday.

Ottawa, May 15.—With practically no discussion the railway committee of the House this morning decided to incorporate the following clause in all the Canadian National branch line bills: "Should it appear to the company upon making final surveys of the said line of railway that the expenditure involved in the completion thereof will exceed the limits of expenditure specified in this act the company shall not commence nor proceed with the work upon the said line of railway without first obtaining the approval of parliament."

The new clause cited above was submitted with the approval of the minister of railways and J. P. M. Baxter accepted it in substitution of an amendment he proposed yesterday.

The clause was then carried and will be inserted in all the branch line bills.

COOLIDGE VETOES SOLDIERS' BONUS

Sponsor of Bonus Motion Will
Attempt To Have Vetoes
Overridden.

Washington, May 15.—President Coolidge today vetoed the soldiers' bonus bill passed at this session of the United States Congress. On the heels of his disapproval of the Bureau pension bill, because he felt it would be an undue strain on the treasury, the President sent back to the Capitol for the same reason the compensation measure, which would give free life insurance policies to great war veterans.

Advocates of the bill immediately announced that an attempt would be made to pass it over the veto. On its original passage it received more than the two-thirds vote necessary to override the veto in both senate and house.

BUSH FIRES RAGING IN NORTH ALBERTA

Telegraph Communications
With Peace River Country
Cut Off.

Edmonton, May 15.—Bush fires are raging over wide areas in Northern Alberta today. The most serious outbreaks are west of Edmonton, northwest of Athabasca and in the Peace River country. Six hundred thousand feet of logs, the property of H. Roberts, were burned near Whitecourt, northwest of Edmonton. Telegraph communication with the Peace River country has been interrupted by the fires burning the poles, bringing the wires down with them. So far no loss of life has been reported.

HOMESTEADS BURNED OUT.

Prince Albert, May 15.—Word reached the city today that disastrous fires swept large areas in Alinsky, North Side and Paddock Wood districts, about 25 miles north of Prince Albert, burning out two homesteads without loss of life to human or stock. Numerous bush fires were raging early this morning in the district named, but are now petering out. It is rumored that another fire is still active on an Indian reserve north of Alinsky.

VARIETY OF NEW BOOKS FOR WARDSVILLE LIBRARY

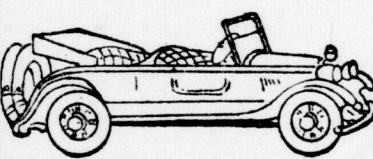

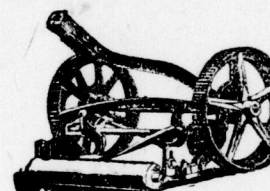
