

A shot of this sort needs overspin to make it "hug the green," and a lofted club imparts backspin and has the opposite effect. A backspin shot will bite into the green, slow up suddenly, and jump about in an uncertain manner, making the distance to the cup hard to gauge. An overspin shot which rolls ahead in a straight line is a much safer stroke, and an approach cleek is the proper clubs to produce this effect.
