Beer Permit To Be Sought For L. and P. S. Cafeteria

YOUTH IS DEFENDED

Rev. R. B. Cochrane Declares Present Generation Better Than Past.

MISSIONS REPORT

Rev. Dr. A. Gandier Gives an Outline of Conditions in Mother Country.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, June 8 .- Young people of 1925 are brave, honest and religiuos the Presbyterian assembly was told today by the Rev. R. B. Cochrane, minister of College street church where the sessions are being held. Dr. Cochrane came vigorously to the defence of modern youth while presenting the report of the board on work in Sunday schools and among young people.

"There is." he said, "a good deal of indiscriminate and loose criticism of the youth of today. I have ministered for ten years in this church, in the boarding house and college dis-trict, and to my mind this criticism is almost altogether unfounded.

"The youth of the church, as I know him, belongs to a splendid hopeful, adventurous generation. The youth of today is intellectually honyouth of today is intellectually hon-est, he has a determination to know the truth. He hates intolerance. He is a little impatient of dogma. He does not find it easy to subscribe to creeds of the past, but he has a pas-sionate love for righteousness. He rails at the church largely because he thinks the church is not on the job as it might be. The youth of to-day is more religious than the youth day is more religious than the youth of any other day. I hope the United church will have the spirit and out-look to challenge such a youth as I have described. It will be a church looking to the future, not the past; a church with a world outlook putting emphasis on the essentials."

The morning session was occupied with presentation of Dr. Cochrane's report and with a report on foreign missions given by Rev. Dr. Gandier, principal of Knox college. Dr. Cochrane declared that the Sunday schools had more than kept pace with the growth of the church at large since 1875, and he urged still greater co-operation.

Ensuing noise notified neighbors that the Rechkos were fighting again, and a crowd of 100 stood in front of 405 Nelson street as the battle progressed Neison street as the battle progressed.

Mrs. Rechko won the first advance, and Rechko himself, fearing for his safety, notified the police.

Four times in English Rechko threatened his wife with death, two constables related to magistrate Graydon in court this morning.

The quarrel followed police court proceedings of several weeks ago, when Fred Rechko was charged by his wife with non-support. Hundreds of neighbors, attracted by the noise the husband and wife created in their dispute, witnessed the battle, police

Clock Is Weapon.

Rechko shoved his wife aside to begin with, the court was to'd. Then Mrs. Rechko struck him with her hand. She followed up the attack with an alarm clock as her weapon Twice Rechko was struck on th head, once on the nose and once on the arm. Scars and bruises he re-vealed in court this morning as evi-dence of his wife's bad temper. Both Mr. and Mrs. Rechko were defended by counsel in this morning's court. On the disorderly conduct charges, each was find \$10 and costs. Mrs. Rechko intimated she would lay information against her husband for breach of the wives' maintenance

Commission Makes Decision On Beer Sale After Little Discussion

MAY BE MONOPOLY

Desirable That Other Permits Should Not Be Issued At Port.

The London & Port Stanley Railvay commission decided at a meeting this morning to make application for a permit to sell 4.4 beer at the cafeteria on the board walk at Port Stanley. Application will also be made for permission to sell the new beverage in the Bridge street booth if, after investigation by General Manager Richards, such a step should appear desirable.

After considerable discussion, the commissioners reached the decision that, as it was inevitable that the new beer would be placed on sale at the Port this summer, it was in the best interests of all concerned that C. N. R. Lunch Counter Serves the cafeteria should take over the sale of the beverage, under the strictest supervision, rather than allow permits to be secured by some of the privately-owned booths along the board walk.

The Only Permits.

Passengers on trains through London now have an opportunity of sampling 4.4 beer while the trains make their ten-minute stops. The Canadian National Railways lunch counter in the depot has received a license and the beer is frothing from the faucets.

The customer cannot drink it at the soda fountain, however—this trick beverage that has kept the wets number of citizens who are patrons heat-stricken area.

Monopoly Advisable,

After considering the problem from all angles, the outstanding point seemed to be that the new beer would certainly be sold by somebeer would certainly be sold by some-body at the lake resort, and it seemed obvious that, such being the case, the municipally owned and con-trolled establishment would be the most desirable place of sale, espe-cially as it was altogether likely that application for a permit by the Lon-don & Port Stanley commission would be the means of preventing the issuance of a permit to other individuals, since the Toronto authorities would then be able to point out that the new beer was al ready on sale at Port Stanley. The commission was finally unanimous in instructing Manager Richards to apply for the necessary permit.

TOWNSHIP ASSESSED \$110,005 HIGHER

Westminster Figures Affected by Suburban Land Prices.

Westminster township assessment has been increased \$110,005 this year, according to figures given the township council at today's session by R. W. Milne, Glanworth, township asessor. The increased assessment is accounted for mostly in the suburban area district, Mr. Milne stated, and

area district, Mr. Milne stated, and business and income assessment, which has practically doubled. The total assessment is \$5,398,195.

There is an increase in the dog population of the township of exactly 100, which will mean \$200 additional in taxes.

Mr. Milne's report, which was accepted by the council, shows that there are in the township 63,284½ acres of land. Of this amount, 57,146 acres are cleared, 1,161½ acres slash, and 580 acres of swamp land. Buildings are valued at \$2,302,945 and business assessment totals \$22,545.


