



Obliging Messenger Relieved of Big Roll by Gang at

From Our Own Correspondent. MONTREAL, June 30 .- By a clever trick on the part of sharpers, Herald Murray, messenger in the employ of H. & A. Allan, was relieved yesterday of \$1,000, which had been drawn to pay the office staff their weekly salaries. When the messenger left the Mer-

chants' Bank at noon he had \$1,500 in bills in an inside pocket and several thousand dollars in a satchel, which was the wages of the dock laborers. He noticed nothing wrong till he reached the office, and there missed the money. He then remembered a little ruse of which he had been the victim.

When he reached the office he saw three well dressed men fumbling at the revolving door and apparently at a loss how to get in. He showed them they were turning the door the wrong way, and as he began to explain the mechanism they all closed in, and in that move. it is likely the money was stolen.

Mr. Murray remembered seeing one of the men at the bank, but only afterwards did he see through their little game, and never suspected them, as they were so gentlemanly in appearance. The messenger has carried thousands of dollars for the firm and took the loss keenly, but he was assured by the Messrs. Allen that there was no need of worrying, as they did not blame him. The police were called in, but have been able to find any trace of the thies
