THE RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

The experiment of visiting Nanaimo for the annual prize meeting of the British Columbia Rifle Association, has proved a very popular well as successful one, there being no disputing the fact that the range there is the best yet established in the province and capable of extension and development with little trouble or expense.

It is worth mentioning that at the annual meeting of the competitors not one word of disapproval was expressed; of the programme and prize list as framed, or as amended in justice to the civilian riflemen of Nanaimo, nor was there the least criticism of any of the actions of the council.

CIVILIAN AGGREGATE. Restricted to competitors not entered in either of the active militia, and not included in H.M.'s regular list.

The competition for this trophy was this year changed so as to be between teams of ten representing each of the two battalions of the Fifth Regiment, instead of for company teams of five as for a few years past.

It was an aggregate competition, extending over the whole meeting.

The special gold medal offered by Lieut.-Col. Wolfenden, the ex-president, for the highest score made in the Ottawa team match was taken by Corp. W. J. Sloan of New Westminster, with a score of 94.

In the Extra Series aggregate, taken by Sergt. E. McDougall of Victoria, with a total of 91 out of 100 at the four ranges.

THE WALKER MATCH. The scores of the individual prize winners in the Walker match, fired on Saturday morning, were as follows:
