Storms and floods visited China and Japan during July, and the early part of August. On July 18 a typhoon struck Hongkong, causing the wreck of junks and sampans, resulting in the death of a number of men. Several houses were also wrecked and 11 persons killed. On August 6 another typhoon came along and besides doing damage to the mosquito fleet blew down several houses, and in one case 12 persons were killed. At Kobe and along the southern coast of Japan on the 12th inst. considerable damage was done by heavy wind and rain, small boats being wrecked and crops badly damaged. The greatest damage was done, however, by floods along the West river. Several villages were entirely swept away, many lost their lives and thousands were rendered homeless. The water in many places reached the roofs of the houses.
