Pike and Sur yeyor McGeorge gave our reporter the following interesting facts: For some time past Mr. Pike, in company with some other gentlemen, has been cultivating a farm of six hundred acres in Dover West, which farm had to be conquered something after the fashion of the land of Holland. This experiment proving a success, Mr. Pike and his company have crossed the river and secured by purchase two thousand five hundred acres of land, and the work of reclaiming it is to be commenced immediately. The great problem is to secure successful drainage, and to solve this satisfactorily and permanently they have secured the services of the government secured the services of the government dredge, which is to commence operations on Thursday of this week; so as to get the work completed by this fall. Under the drainage act the township of Raleigh is the drainage act the township of Raieigh is negotiating this great improvement which will, in this instance, cost about \$7 per acre. The machinary ordered through Mr. Pike and Mr. McGregor, of R. Parkinson will cost \$2900. The total cost of the enterprise will be paid back by an annual assessment to extend over a period of fifteen years.
