DRATH OF HENRY FAWCETT.

The End of the British Reform-General—Eulogized by M. P.'s. LONDON, Nov. 5.—Henry Fawcett, postmaster-general, died to-day. He was born in Salisbury in 1833. A few years after obtaining his majority he lost his eyesight by an accident while out shooting. At 30 years of age he was elected professor of political economy in the University of Cambridge. In 1865 and 1868 he represented Devon in the House of Commons, and at the accession to power of the present government accepted the position of postmaster-general.
