

CINCINNATI, Feb. 22.—The police have arrested a man who is believed to be the notorious pincher who has recently frightened and hurt women in New Orleans, Louisville and this city. About a week ago the fellow arrived here and at once began to attack women in the street after nightfall, pinching them severely on the arms, face and legs. His depredations caused considerable excitement, but he disappeared for a day or two, after pinching several Covington girls. Yesterday Miss Ella Maloney, whowas in the Little Mismidepot, was viciously pinched by a strange man who had followed her. Shie pointed him out to the police before he could escape and the fellow was locked up in the station house. He gave his name as Charles E. Baker, aged 24, of Newark, N.J.

Miss Maloney, whom he assaulted, and two or three other witnesses, will give damaging testimony against him in the Police Court.
