A MEASURE WILL BE INTRODUCED. The New South Wales Parliament Declares For Single Tax.

A vote took place in the New South Wales Parliament on Oct. 18 regarding the land question.

It had been becoming daily more evident that radical action on the land question in New South Wales could not be much longer delayed; and, with the evident design of testing the feeling of the House, a support-er of the Government (Mr. Chapman) in-troduced a resolution declaring for a pro-gressive land tax on holdings over a thound pounds in value.

This was opposed by Mr. Cotton (single taxer), who moved the following straight single tax amendment:

"That in the opinion of this house a system of raising revenue by the direct taxation of land values, irrespective of improvements, would greatly promote the welfare

ments, would greatly promote the welfare of this country."

In the debate which ensued the Premier, Sir George Dibbs, stated that he should vote for Mr. Cotton's amendment; also that the Government intended to press the "Local Government bill," which authorizes the municipalities to raise their revenues by a tax on land values without reference to the improvements on the land.


