## "SCRAP OF PAPER" CHANCFLLOR DIES

Bethmann-Honweg Passes Away
After Brief Illness.

HAD RETIRED IN 1917

Headed Kaiser's Calinet At Outbreak of the War.

BERLIN, Jan. 2.—(Associated Press Cable)—Dr. Theobald Von Bethmann-Hollweg, former German imperial chancellor, died last night after a brief Illness on his estate at Hohenfinow, near

Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg was the originator of the famous reference to treaty guaranteeing the neutrality of Belgium as a "scrap of paper," The reference was made in a statement before the Reichstag in August, 1914, when he gave the German viewpoint of what causes led to the war. He frankly admitted in this same speech that Germany's action in invading Belgium had been morally and legally wrong. He justified it only on the grounds of "military necessity."

HIS RECORD

Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg was chancellor of Germany from July 4, 1909, to July 14, 1917. He was succeeded in the office by Dr. George Michaelis, an appointee of the former kaiser. It was said that Von Bethmann-Hollweg was forced out of office through the efforts of the militarists, headed by Von Hindenburg and Ludendorff, largely because of his "scrap of paper" statement and his admission that the German invasion of Belgium was unjust. The former chancellor had on several occasions issued statements blaming the militarists for the war, these appearing in 1916 and 1917, while in the two previous years he had frequently declared that England alone was responsible.

Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg received prominent attention throughout the world in June, 1919, when he formally asked the allied and associated powers to place him on trial instead of the former kaiser. The supreme council decided to ignore his request. He was often mentioned as among those who might be tried by the allies for political offenses in connection with the origin of the war.

His national activities before 1914

of the war.

His national activities before 1914
were marked by his strong opposition
to democratization of Germany. At
times he was sharply outspoken in his
defiance of Socialism and he rejected
any move to make himself and the
other German ministers responsible to
the Reichstag. In the early stages of
the war, however, he became known as
a moderate. Late in 1919 reports from
Geneva said he was credited in diplomatic circles there as being at the bottom of a monarchist movement in favor
of both the Hohenzollerns and Hapsburgs, the nucleus of which was said
to be under way in Switzerland. On
several occasions during his tenure of
office Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg threw
out peace feelers, particularly in 1916,
when he invited the allies to enter
negotiations. All of his overtures contained only the vaguest indications regarding the German attitude on a peace
settlement and they were rejected.

It was on the failure of his peace
efforts in December, 1916, that he indorsed unlimited submarine warfare.

In Auto Hit by G. T. Train Near Toronto

TORONTO, Jan. 2.—Mrs. Louisa Bernard, of Downview, a short distance from this city, and her son, Gordon, aged 12, and daughter, Vera, aged 5, were killed on New Year's Day while coming to Toronto in an auto driven by Mr. Bernard.

The auto was hit by a Grant Trunk train at a level crossing and was cut in two. The mother and Gordon and Vera were in the back seat of the machine. The father and one child in the front seat escaped injury.

## KENT YOUTH VICTIM OF HUNTING ACCIDENT

Edward Carswell, 17, Son of Comden Farmer, Killed by His Own Gun THAMESVILLE, Jan. 1.—(Special to The Free Press)—Edward Carswell, son of Edward Carswell, of the Camden-Zone town line, was almost instantly killed this afternoon by the accidental discharge of a gun in his own hands. The young man, who was out hunting, tripped and fell with his gun, the discharge entering the abdomen, and death quickly followed.

Edward, who was about 17 years of age, was a bright pupil in Form II., of the continuation school, here.

## WM. FITZGERALD DIES AT OTTAWA, AGED 78

Former Superintendent of Insurance and a Native of This City

OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—William Fitzgerald, former superintendent of insurance for the Dominion Government in the finance department, died here to-day in his 78th year.

He was a native of London, Ont., and came to Ottawa as assistant deputy minister and superintendent of insurance on December 1, 1885.

Previously he had practised law in Toronto.

HALIFAX LAWYER AND NAVAL COMMANDER KILLED IN NOVA SCOTIA



GERMANY REDUCES
ARMY TO 96,000 MEN

BERLIN, Jan. 1.—Official announcement was made to-day that Germany's armed forces have been reduced to 96,000 men in accordance with the promise made to the allies. The statement added that 50,000 pleces of ordinance have been destroyed as well as 5,000,000 rifles, 60,000 machine guns and 14,000 aero-
