Half-yearly Taxes.

It seems inevitable that taxes like nearly everything else, should go up, and add to the high cost of living. But there is at least one method by which the Council can ameliorate the burden, and that is by having the taxes paid in two instalments. The semi-yearly collection of taxes is in force in many towns, in Barrie and Collingwood for instance and in cities like Toronto and Brantford. A prominent resident of Collingwood said recently that the change had been a regular Godsend to the workingmen of that town. "It means," he said, "that many a man who, after paying taxes early in December, would have little or no money left for his Christmas presents, is now able to make his children happy at that season." In many cases a rate-payer who has, say, \$30 to pay in taxes would find it much easier to pay two instalments of \$15 each. It is not the workingmen alone who would welcome the change. Business men like to have large pay-ments broken up. Many people pay as much for light as they do for taxes, but because the payments are made monthly they feel it much less, and do not grumble, though they may be getting very much less value than they do for their taxes. Nor is all the advantage to the ratepayer, as in the spring the town would profit by saving interest on a part of what now has to be borrowed to keep things going till the taxes come in.

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
