Chief of the Peking Mounted Police Consented He Had Been Bribed to Assassinate Yuan Shi Kai -Brilliant Scene at Induction of New Fresident.

Pekin, Oct. 10.-Yuan Shi Kai was oday inducted into the office of Presdent of the Chinese Republic, and the ceremony of inauguration was surrounded with eastern brilliance. It was attended by throngs of distinguished Chinese and foreign officials, diplomats and military officers, and took place in the interior of the Tai-He palace, in which many of the Ming and Ching emperors had teen crowned.

The choice of the place of inauguration was a further encroachment on the sacred precincts of the Emperor within the Forbidden City.
