THE CROPS.

Our hay crop this year is light-in some places not more than one-third, in others not more than one-half the usual crop. On low lands there was a fair crop. but much of it is lost or damaged by freshets. Potatoes are a fair crop, slightly affected with blight. Wheat, wherever sown, did well. Swedish turnips, oats and buckwheat succeeded well. Apples were a light crop, about half that of 1864. Beets, carrots, parsnips and cabbages did well in gardens. None of these vegetables are cultivated here as a field crop. Cranberries were unusually plentiful. Strawberries were a fair crop; but raspberries, blueberries and gooseberries were a very light crop.

PRICES OF PRODUCE.

The price of farm produce is nearly as follows:--Hay, 50s. per ton; beef, 30s. per 100 lbs.; pork, 5d. per lb.; butter, 1s. per lb.; potatoes, Is. 6d. per bushel; oats, 2s. per bushel; wheat, 10s. per bushel, geese, 1s. 3d. to 1s. 6d. each; cows, £4 to £6 each; working oxen, £15 to £20 per pair; lambs, 8s. to 10s. each; old ewes, 10s. to 15s. each; twilled homespun cloth for trousers, all wool, 4s. to 5s. per yard; twilled cotton and wool for trousers, 3s. to 4s. per yard; flannel cotton and wool, plain, 2s. 6d. per yard; flannel twilled, all wool for blankets, 4s. per yd.; raw hides, 3d. per lb.; wool, 1s. 6d. per Ib.; eggs, 6d. per doz.; chickens, 1s. 3d. per pair.

BARRINGTON AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The directors of the Barrington Agricultural Society for the past year beg to report, that in accordance with instructions received at the last annual meeting, a number of fruit trees were purchased of Mr. Shaw at Cornwallis, and a quantity of seeds of various kinds at Boston and Halifax; these were distributed equally among members previous to sowing time. The Goodrich potatoes could not be obtained, but a barrel of early Harrison and Schee have been ordered and will be available for planting the ensuing spring.

A ram and ewe of the Cotswold breed have been purchased of Mr. Decie at Wilmot, and to avoid additional expense to the society have been sold with the restrictions that they are to be kept in

good condition, under the supervision of the directors for four years.

A boar and sow were obtained from Prince Edward Island and sold under similar instructions, the purchaser being to keep the hoar for nine months and the sow for eighteen months for breeding.

It was deemed advisable that the contemplated agricultural show should not be held the past autumn, as it was supposed the funds could be more judiciously expended in the purchase of stock and seeds. It is however recommended that arrangements be made for holding a show next autumn, and that suitable premiums be awarded to deserving exhibitors.

During the present year sixty names have been enrolled as members of the society, the subscriptions have been paid to the Treasurer, the requisite documents forwarded to the Central Board, and it is believed the order for drawing the government money will soon be received.
