### PROTECTION OF TREES FROM IN-SECTS.

The following simple method of preserving fruit trees from ravages of insects is recommended by the Director of the school of Arboriculture of the Parc de la Fete d'or at Lyons:—The-e creatures are said to have a great antipathy to vinegar, the mere odour of which is enough to drive them away, and in some cases to destroy them, and nothing more is required than to sprinkle the branches with a mixture of vinegar and water at the moment the blossoms begin to appear.-The mixture recommended consists of one part of vinegar to nine parts of water, but as the French vinegar is very strong, perhaps the amount of water should be less when English vinegar is used. When mixed, the solution is to be sprinkled over the flower-buds, by means of a garden syringe. or wateringpot, with a fine rose. Said to be very effective.

### A CHEAP AND SURE GRUB-KILLER.

Cauliflowers, brocolis, and other brassicaceous plants (cabbage tribe) are generally much infested with grubs and parasites at certain seasons of growing time. To clear them off is an easier task than it appears. Dissolve a cupfull (coffeecup) of salt in hot water, then put it into a common sized watering-pot, and fill up with cold water Just give each plant a gentle switch over with this mixture, and they will all disappear, and the salt and water will nourish the plants wonderfully. Some persons would be afraid of killing their cauliflowers; but it must be borne in mind that the salt and water will not penetrate the leaves; it runs off to the roots-killing every caterpillar in its way.—From the Gardener's Magazine.
