"I know that we are Abraham's seed." There was a sense in which he allowed that they were the children of Abraham visibly but not spiritually, for he immediately adds, if we were Abraham's children we would do the works of Abraham," and then he tells them whatever they may fancy because of their outward descent from Abraham, yet the devil was their father, whose devds they In a similar sense, then, though in bartism, person are accounted by the Church as made children of God, yet when no evidence of this is visible, but, on the contrary, the works of the devil are wrought, we have good reason to say that they are not God's children in reality, but his children whose works they live in. In this light, then, the language of Wesley and Beveridge is quite clear: take that of the former, addressing those who were living in sin, so I should pressure, for I have not Wesley's sermons to refer to, he says, alluding to their haptism, "Who denies that ye were then made children of God, and heirs of the kingdom of beaven." They were so in the eyes of the Church, "But notwithstanding this," he adds, "ye are now the children of the devil, therefore ye must be born again." It is very evident that in reality we cannot be the children of God and the children of the devil: If, come the former; but in the sense above referred to we come the former; but in the sense above referred to we may be accounted the children of God by the Church, and yet for all that be the children of the devil, for they are not all Israel which are of Israel. And in this sense I can use even the language of Bishop Beveridge, quoted by your correspondent, and, as a parsot, rejuice in the belief that God will falfil his gracious promise towards my offspring, but at the same time the quotations which I also gave from Beveridge in my last, I believe to be in accord-ance with the word of God and our Church, as known by

our authorized formularies.
