New York, June 10.—The Star editorially states that it has special information from Ireland that a great crisis is imminent there. The people are armed and ready to use their weapons. Skirmishers are about to exchange stones, scythes and shillelahs for revolvers and repeating rifles, which have been obtained through secret agencies in France, HALIFAX, N. S. | Germany and America.
