

PAUL TREMBLAY

Mr. Paul Tremblay was born in Chicoutimi, Quebec, on July 6, 1914. He is a graduate of the University of Montreal (B.A., L.L.B. and L.Sc.Soc.) and studied at McGill University and George Washington University. He was called to the Bar of the Province of Quebec and practised law in Montreal.

In 1940, Mr. Tremblay joined the Department of External Affairs and served in Canadian diplomatic missions at Washington from 1943 to 1946, Santiago from 1946 to 1949, The Hague from 1951 to 1954, and as Minister-Counsellor with the Canadian Delegation to the North Atlantic Council and the Organization for the European Economic Council in Paris from 1954 to 1957. In 1959, Mr. Tremblay was appointed Canadian Ambassador to Chile and in 1962 was appointed as Permanent Representative to the United Nations in New York, with the rank of Ambassador. In 1965, he was named Canadian Delegate to the 37th Resumed Session of ECOSOC. In 1966, Mr. Tremblay was appointed as Canadian Ambassador to Belgium and Luxembourg as well as to the European Coal and Steel Community, the European Economic Community, and Euratom. He returned to Canada in 1970, assuming the rank of Associate Under-Secretary of State for External Affairs.

Mr. Tremblay is married and has three children.
